

A Message from Pastor Mark Schuring



For You. For Me. For Us.

Avid students of the Small Catechism marvel at the simplicity of Luther's answer to the potentially vexing question, "Who, then, is worthy to receive this sacrament?"

Luther's answer: the person who has faith in the words, "for you."

Faith is what lies behind the single word we say when receiving the sacrament.

After hearing the words, "The body of Christ given for you," and "The blood of Christ shed for you," our "Amen" spoken in response is not primarily an affirmation

of the claim that this is Christ's body and blood, but that Christ's body and blood are "for me!"

"Amen!" we say. "As surely as I am in need of forgiveness, life and salvation, so surely has Christ given me and all sinners this wondrous gift! Amen!"

Luther's answer is no innovation, but a perfectly simple application of the apostolic faith to a person of faith. In the creed, we find the same joyful confession: "For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven." Understood in light of the communicant's single-word response, "Amen," our use of the creed is not primarily to identify a list of divine attributes and actions we hold to be true, but to embrace the whole business as having been done "for us!"

In the spirit of this joyful, simple faith, let me draw your attention to a Lenten hymn written about 100 years before Luther, Oh Love, How Deep. (LBW #88; ELW #322) Its medieval English tune can be a little stark for some, but as a treasure of "for us" faith, this hymn has no rival.

No less than thirteen times, the hymn sounds forth with one or another example of how Christ's life was lived, given, endured, shared, "for us."

The first "for us" is Jesus' baptism by John in the Jordan River. The last is his sending of the holy and lifegiving Spirit at Pentecost. And as a frame around all thirteen examples of Jesus' self-giving for us, the hymn's author names the incarnation and our hope of eternal life.

At every turn, the pious 15th century monastic author of this hymn, Thomas à Kempis, sees Christ giving himself again for us and for our salvation. His hymn has remained in use for 600 years, if you can imagine that! I wonder if its lasting quality is its unabashed awe at the gift of Christ.

And I wonder if we might think of our life in such a way. Perhaps we as a community of faith might think of practical ways to live this out.

The narrative of Christ that we ponder and celebrate is the incarnate God who lives, dies, and rises "for us." In a glorious exchange, God takes our sinfulness and gives us life and salvation in return. If this is the central story of our faith, our simple joy, how can our life together be anything different? Is not the Church, at its best, a community of faith lived for its neighbors?



Consequently Jesus is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them. Hebrews 7:25

As we studied our lessons for the Fifth Sunday of Lent I came across a commentary from Luther Seminary's Working Preacher website written by Jennifer T. Kaalund, an Assistant Professor of Religious Studies at Iona College in New Rochelle, New York. Her commentary on the Letter to the Hebrews provides some interesting insight into prayer.

Although classed with the letters of the New Testament, the Letter to the Hebrews is considered to be a sermon or as its conclusion labels it, a word of exhortation. We heard part of it read on the Fifth Sunday of Lent. As we studied it earlier in the week Kaalund points out that the writer of Hebrews connects the earthly Jesus to the heavenly Christ by informing us, In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission (5:7). As Jesus was on this earth he prayed fervently and then the writer of Hebrews reveals that once he ascended to heaven Jesus continues to pray since he always lives to make intercession for us.

Jesus' earthly prayers were pleads; Jesus was crying out to God. We can easily recognize this Jesus from the Garden of Gethsemane. In Hebrews the writer indicates that Jesus continues to pray. Jesus is referred to as a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek. Kaalund explains that the office of the high priest was held in great regard in antiquity. Priests stand between God and God's people. They are mediators. In fact, the Latin word for priest, pontifex, means bridge maker. Isn't it appealing to think of the concept of priests or preachers as bridge makers?

What is even more appealing is the thought of Jesus Christ, our crucified and risen Lord, as a bridge maker. God sent Jesus of Nazareth to this world to be a bridge maker. Jesus is the connector for us between this world and God's kingdom. God is revealed to us through Jesus and the world is saved through the death and resurrection of Christ.

Another way we can consider Jesus to be a bridge maker is through our prayer life. Kaalund writes; God calls us into relationship, through communication—after all, this is what prayer is—and as a result we move closer to the source of our eternal salvation. Prayer is the iron for that bridge that connects us to God. Jesus, then and there, as well as here and now, prayed for us, makes intercession on our behalf.

Having someone in our corner, being our rock when we find ourselves in hard places provides an example for how we are to act likewise. Can you be a rock? Will you build a bridge?

So as we celebrate this Easter Season let us continue to keep the words of St. Paul in mind as we deepen our prayer lives and strive to be bridge makers...

"Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God." Philippians 4:6

Some of you in the congregation may not be aware of what happens to the food after you donate it on *Care and Share Sunday*. I thought I would explain.

If you have noticed there is always a list in the bulletin each month telling us in the congregation what is needed for Care and Share Sunday. The food is housed in the church office on well-organized shelves. Sometimes there is too much of this or that so the list tells you what the Food Pantry needs.

To collect your donations Frank Fanello places the donation containers at the front and side entrances to the church. The following Monday Bill Lambert and Roger Klepzig bring the items to the Food Pantry and sort and shelve them. A big thank you to Frank, Bill, and Roger for doing this. It's a big job to carry all these items from the church to the office, sort, and shelve.

Those who receive food are referred to us by Love INC. Volunteers of LoveINC contact the church office with the family name and number of individuals in the family and also ages of the children. The office staff then go to the pantry and bag the food and toiletries.

Each family is given a 3 day supply of food to cover 3 meals a day. We also give each order: toilet paper, dish detergent, laundry detergent, deodorant, shampoo, bar soap, etc. It's important that we remember the toiletries and detergent. These items are not always available.

The church office also does referrals from local agencies such as Marca, the Health Department, Turning Point, etc. We also receive names from our own church family.

This is a wonderful outreach for our church family and community. Remember, it's the 4th Sunday of every month.

The **Social Ministry Board** is again working this year with Voice of Hope and their Baby Bottle Campaign to raise money for their ministry. The Board Members will have Baby Bottles available on Sunday, May 6, the campaign runs through May 27. Thanks in advance for your support.
