Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect. Romans 12.2


To be transformed by the renewing of your mind--this is what a deepened prayer life can do for each of us and the way to achieve a deepened prayer life is through practice.

Now in this world we practice many things until they develop into habits that help us maintain ourselves. We learn early on to wash up before meals, to brush our teeth in the morning and at night, to eat three square meals and to get adequate rest. We learn that we must pay attention to instructions that will help us perform well in our job and we learn to budget our money so we can be somewhat financially stable. We do these things for our survival in this world.

As humans though we are amusing creatures. Are we as concerned about our spiritual lives as much as we are about our worldly lives? Do we practice our spirituality until it becomes a habit? I think it is safe to say that we all would like to have a closer relationship with God, but on the other hand we often seem to have difficulty finding time to do something about it. And of course what is ironic about that is that we will find time to play cards, watch our favorite television shows, read a murder mystery or simply go for a walk. In order for us to have a closer relationship with God, in order for us to be transformed, we must deepen our prayer lives through practice. Throughout the past year I have offered a few prayer practices for you to experience. As we begin a new church year I challenge you to return to some of these practices and spend time in those practices. In addition there are twenty copies of Creating a Life with God being passed around the congregation that offer you instructions on how to expand upon your prayer life. Also, in January we will begin a six-week book study entitled Grounded in Prayer. Details about that study can be found on page 4 in this newsletter.

Also, thank you to Cindy and Dave Strazalka for honoring my commissioning with the donation of the elements of Holy Communion. The cards, the words,

the blessings and prayers touched my heart. With God as my guide, I look forward to this commission to serve and grow in Christ.

With all that being said, you may be asking what does the term Parish Deacon mean in easy terminology.

- It is a "non -salaried" position volunteer.
- It requires graduation from the Diakonia curriculum, an approved internship plan, a
 psychological evaluation, an intense plan approval from the Parish Deacon Steering Committee
 (consisting of 4 pastors or more), as well as the Pastor and Parish Planning Committee of the
 church where you will serve.
- A Parish Deacon serves in the means that is agreed to serve the congregation best using the individual talents. It could be in pastoral care, teaching, preaching, prayer, Bible Study... the possibilities are great.
- A Parish Deacon is supervised directly by the pastor. If the pastor would leave the
 congregation, that would also end the parish deacon's service. The new pastor could recall the
 parish deacon if he/ she would choose.
- Pastor Mark Schuring is rostered as a Minister of the Word and Sacrament.
- Deacon Kevin Kehn is rostered as a Minister of Word and Service.
- Tanyce Addison is a Commissioned Lay Parish Deacon.

Grounded in Prayer: A Small Group Training Guide for Congregational Prayer by Brent W. Dahlseng will be offered as a book study on Mondays, January 28

through March 4. Sessions will be offered 11:00-11:30a.m. and 6:00-7:30p.m. This book reminds us that in the parable of the sower (Mark 4:1-20), the seed of faith falls on four types of soil: the hardened path, rocky ground, thorny ground, and good soil. This book explores how the Holy Spirit works in our hearts to break up the hardened soil of the path, unseat the rocks of distraction, uproot the thorns and thistles of the world and plant the seed of faith deeply into good soil. This introductory study covers six themes:

Week 1: The Groundwork of Prayer

Week 2: Sharpening Your Personal Tools for Prayer

Week 3: Praying for the Hardened Path Week 4: Praying for the Rock Ground Week 5: Praying for the Thorny Ground

Week 6: Blessing the Good Soil

Grounded in Prayer provides daily exercises for each of the six weeks. Use the prayer exercises to deepen you own prayer life and develop or strengthen your daily discipline of prayer and reading the Bible. This book can serve several purposes; to launch new prayer groups, strengthen existing groups and emphasize the importance of prayer in the congregation.

In January there will be a sign-up sheet in the Gathering Space for those who are interested. Books will be provided for all participants, partially funded by a Thrivent Financial grant.



Work Our Hands Service Projects organized by the Board of Social Ministry was a wonderful success! Thank you to all who offered your time and talent to support the community outreach projects. Many responded that they felt as blessed by the opportunity to give as those that received. Relationships were created. The February service Sunday will be dedicated to filling and mailing the remaining 7 military care packages as well as an opportunity write letters/cards to military family members. This time it's only appropriate for me to tell you about

"Cheer Plates".

There is a long history

for "Cheer Plates" given at Christmas time from the church. This ministry was started many years ago. Records were found recently that go back to 1978 but I remember and others have told me "Cheer Plates" were started long before 1978.

Women of The Church Circle ladies were the ones that planned, bought what goes into the plates, put them together, and delivered them back then to the shut-ins and members in nursing homes. They consisted of fruit, cookies, etc. The containers at one time were pie plates donated by Ponderosa Steak House and the fruit was bought from Lawrence Orchard.

Since 1988 there is a chairperson, (the same person today) that organizes and gets volunteers to assemble and deliver "Cheer Plates". They are not exactly the same as years ago but very similar. Today they are delivered to shut-ins at home and in assisted living facilities but not nursing homes. Nursing homes limit what their residents can receive so they receive a non food item as a gift. I have seen the faces of a lot of the people that receive a "Cheer Plate" and they are so happy to know the church remembers them at Christmas.






