



The apostles gathered around Jesus, and told him all that they had done and taught. He said to them, "Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while." For many were coming and going, and they had no leisure even to eat. (Mark 6:30-31] It's the middle of summer and I pray that by now you've taken some time for rest and relaxation. There have been times in the past few weeks when our Lutheran Center office has resembled a ghost town because of the scarcity of people. We have a small staff to begin with and when two or more are away, the building is extremely quiet.

And it is at this opportune moment that we read in the lectionary the invitation from our Lord Jesus Christ to his disciple to come away to a deserted place and rest awhile. These words seem comforting and timely.

I can't help but think about the words of St. Augustine, who wrote: "You have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless, until they can find rest in you."

I'm also reminded of the words of Jesus in the gospel according to Matthew, which we often hear at funerals: Come to me, all you that are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest. [Matthew 11:28]

At the risk of sounding somewhat morbid, when you think about it, death is perhaps the only time we are truly at rest.

Undoubtedly, we live in a busy world. Despite all the time saving devices in our homes and work places, we still find it a challenge to do the things we like to do, to spend more time with our families, volunteer more of our time to a charity or to our church. We pack our lives so full that the day is finished before we've accomplished half of what we wanted to do.

Stress is an all too common fact in our lives. As a nation, we are in a constant state of anxiety. The end result is that we feel tired; or we find ourselves being angry at other people for almost no reason at all or, even more commonly, we feel unable to think good thoughts or do what we believe are good things. We are not at peace.

The National Sleep Foundation conducted a survey between 1999 and 2004 which revealed that 40 million Americans suffer from over 70 different sleep disorders, and 60 percent of adults report having sleep problems a few nights a week or more. Even children, 69 percent of them, experience one or more sleep problems a few nights or more during a week.

For Jesus and his disciples, it wasn't much different. They were busy running from town to town, healing people, driving out evil spirits, and trying to meet the people's ever increasing needs. But Jesus basically tells his disciples, "Time out!"

We all know this but more often than not we struggle on - especially those in the helping professions. We don't have time to stop for a while. In fact, we often feel guilty when we do stop for a while and have a bit of "me" time. This lack of rest often can lead us in the wrong direction. We don't assess things well it and make regrettable decisions.

Jesus didn't feel guilty about taking time out. He rested. He prayed. So often in the gospels you will read that. Remember the story about Jesus sleeping in a boat that was being rocked by fierce waves?

He didn't make his disciples feel guilty either. They were human, so was he. They were leading a hectic life. There was a sense of urgency to get as much done as possible in the short time that Jesus had in the world. Yet Jesus has no qualms about having a little bit of time away from the pressures that had been placed on him by others. All of us have days where we need that kind of invitation. Like Jesus, there are moments when we need to get away for a while so do we. We cannot keep up the pace under constant pressure from all directions. We need to retreat, so we may be refreshed and renewed to continue to do what has to be done.

"Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while."

You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself. Luke 25: 27

We are the ones in the ditch and the Samaritan represents God. How is that for an interpretation of the well-known parable of the Good Samaritan? This is one of the many comments made by ELCA Pastor Brian Stoffregen in his sermon notes on the website CrossMarks. Now I do not

think that the primary purpose for Jesus telling us this parable was to put us in the ditch and to make the Samaritan into God, but I do think this line of thinking is worth delving into a bit further.

As Jesus used this popular parable to illustrate that we are to show mercy to our neighbor and that our neighbor is anyone who is in need, I do think we can all identify with the man who was left half dead on the side of the road. We have all been in need of physical, spiritual, or mental healing at some time in our lives. We have all needed to find the mercy of some caring soul to take care of us. Additionally, in terms of our eternal lives, we all know that we are in need of being saved from our sinful ways.

This is where the love and mercy of God, of the Good Samaritan, comes into play. God meets us where we are--even if it is in the ditch when others have ignored us. God provides us with unlimited resources to heal us, not just helping us out of the ditch, but finding us a safe place to stay and promising us continued care. As we are in any number of helpless situations in our lives, God is there granting us grace, granting us healing, and granting us hope. When we are in need and cannot help ourselves we will find God in that person walking by, we will find God in the innkeeper who has put his trust in the Good Samaritan and we will always find hope as we open ourselves to the love and grace of Jesus, our Lord and Savior.

Pastor Stoffregen mentioned that he has used the text of the Good Samaritan at the funeral services of a 19-year-old who had been killed in a car accident and a 2-year-old who died of a disease. He has done so to remind us that there is evil in the world. In the Good Samaritan parable we don't know why the man in the parable is attacked, beaten, and robbed, but it happens. Likewise, we don't always know why young children die. Bad things happen in our lives and I don't believe that such tragedies are part of God's plan.

However, what we do know is that God not only gets into the ditch with the half-dead man, but with suffering parents and friends and with us. Furthermore, as Jesus went to the Cross of Calvary with our sins we know that there is a resurrection "donkey" who transports us to the heavenly "inn" where there is complete recovery from all pain and suffering, where it has all been paid for.

We are all truly victims of brokenness and sin and we have no choice but to give ourselves up to the mercy of God. Until next time, may the peace and healing of God be with you all.

On July 7, 37 people from Emanuel Lutheran, St. Paul Waldo Lutheran, and Peace Community Church traveled by bus to New York City to work with the YSOP (Youth Services Opportunity Projects). Flexibility is the word to keep in mind for a mission trip. We had to remember that on our very first day. We got a call from the bus company at 4:30a.m. that Sunday morning saying our bus was delayed because the windshield wipers wouldn't work. By 8:00a.m. we were all loaded on this second bus and we were settled in. About an hour on the road, the air conditioning stopped working and then it started to blow out heat! About three hours later, we switched buses again! The point of this message is that EVERYONE was flexible! EVERYONE was looking for the good and encouraging each other! We used that lesson throughout our week as we served in food pantries, soup kitchens, gardens, senior centers. We used that attitude as we negotiated the subways, the neighborhoods, the unknown that we would encounter. Emanuel's 15 people were divided into 5 different groups so we all have different stories from our experiences. But the common themes were these:

- We met people who offered guidance to us when we were lost.
- We met people who welcomed us into their service projects so that we could experience a little bit of what they do EVERYDAY.
- We saw hunger, homelessness, and lost souls.
- We had the wonderful opportunity to think about how blessed we are and witness the poorest of poor sharing.
- It was humbling.
- It was eye- opening. It was life changing.

We are so very grateful for our congregation for supporting this mission.

I started a series in the June/July
Newsletter explaining about the banners that
Ann Thomas made that hang in the sanctuary.
This time I will tell you about the banners for
August and September.

The August Banners are about Creation in Genesis, chapter 1. There are 6 banners starting the 1st day creation of light, the 2nd day creation of the expanse (the Heavens), the 3rd day, creation of land and vegetation,

the 4th day creation of light to rule the day and the light to rule the night, the 5th day creation of the sky and sea, and the 6th day, creation of living creatures including man.

The September Banners are what I wrote about for the July Banners. I was told by Ann Thomas that somehow the July and September got switched. So the September Banners represent Matthew 25: 35-36. "For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me. I was in prison and you came to visit me." The banners are done in shades of gray, black, and beige. There is one small item of color in each one. There is a flower, red lips, a three dimensional jacket, a red house, and blue water. Each of the 6 banners has one of these, bread, water, woman with red shirt, child with father, a homeless person, and a person in prison. The father and child are from a real photo. In that family three daughters have had a debilitating disease. Two have died and the third is still alive although she cannot see, hear, communicate or walk. The two other children survive unharmed by the disease.

President Thomas called the meeting to order and Deacon Kehn led devotions and served Holy Communion.

The April PPC minutes were approved. Treasurer Parrott reported that Child Care ended the month with a positive balance; Ed Stofcheck reported that Emanuel ended with a positive balance.

Deacon Kehn reported that he will be leading a book study on "The Compact Guide to The Whole Bible" in August/September; the Synod Day of Prayer will be held in Tiffin on November 6; a new funeral brochure is available; he asked the PPC to keep Pastor James Rave in prayer, he has been diagnosed with pancreatic cancer.

Board Reports: Child Care: Amy Pirnstill reported that the May Yard Sale was successful, they are discussing ways to improve it; and Water Day is July 12.

<u>Communication/Evangelism:</u> Daryl Kraner circulated a list of activities the board has completed this year in coordination with Vision 2020, plus a list of activities they wish to work on; they are manning Emanuel's booth at the Marion County Fair.

<u>Education</u>: Dianne Schuring reported that their board has been busy with the graduation breakfast, confirmation class breakfast and Vacation Bible School; the Mission Trip is next month and the fundraising is complete.

<u>Fellowship</u>: Andrea Ciola reported that Emanuel will participate in the Christmas tour of downtown churches; the Ice Cream Social will be held July 21; are discussing hosting a potluck on Anniversary Sunday, September 8, with an Around The World theme.

Finance: Paula Burnside reported that Consecration Sunday will be October 13.

<u>Properties:</u> Jim Conway reported that the new AC is up and running; other projects include replacing the flooring in the office; updating the chapel and lounge; getting estimates to replace the church roof. <u>Spiritual Life:</u> Cindy Strzalka stated that their board will meet with the Communication/Evangelism Board to review implementation of Vision 2020; the board discussed ways to use the "Welcome" Ed Stofcheck presented to council in April; following discussion it was voted to include the "Welcome" in weekly bulletins every Sunday; President Thomas asked the two board to work together to determine other ways the "Welcome" could be available in the church.

A motion was made to accept all board reports.

President Thomas closed the meeting by members praying the Lord's Prayer.

On a birthday, said Nouwen, "we lift someone up and let everyone say, 'We love you." In baptism, God lifts us to His very heart and declares, "You are my precious child. I love you."
