A Note From Pastor Mark: I am sharing with you a message from our Northwestern Ohio Synod Bishop Beaudoin on the topic of *The Sanctuary Church Body*.

Dear Friends in Christ,

When I was growing up, our neighbor to the south was Mr. Hans Christian Seng. He and his wife Mary operated a "mom and pop greenhouse". They regularly brought us tomato and cucumber "starts" for our garden. After Mary died, and Hans grew older, our family spent a lot of time helping him. Hans was born in Germany. His father was killed in World War I. His mother could not care for the children, so the oldest 2 boys were sent to America in 1921. Hans was 15 years old. His brother was 14. The Lutheran Church sponsored the boys, paid their passage across the Atlantic, enrolled them in school, taught them English, and found them jobs. For the rest of his days, Hans remained grateful for the help he received from the Lutheran Church.

Lutherans have a long and rich history of helping immigrants and refugees. Since 1939, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services have been doing this important work on our behalf. After World War II, the world was not too eager to help the German people, but the Lutherans in America offered aid to German refugees. After the Vietnam War, many Lutheran congregations helped Vietnamese and Hmong people live and thrive in America. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is an immigrant church who has been long committed to serving the alien and the immigrant.

In the Torah we read, "The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the Lord your God" (Leviticus 19:34). The Prophet Jeremiah writes, "Thus says the Lord: Act with justice and righteousness and deliver from the hand of the oppressor anyone who has been robbed. And do no wrong or violence to the alien, the orphan, and the widow, or shed innocent blood in this place." (Jeremiah 22:3). In Matthew 22, Jesus calls us to love God with all our heart, soul, and mind. And to love our neighbor as ourselves. In Matthew 25, Jesus shows us what this love can look like when it is put into action. "For I was hungry, and you gave me food, I was thirsty, and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me" (Matthew 25:35).

Caring for the vulnerable, the stranger and the alien is deeply rooted in God's Word and lived through the people of God on a daily basis through the power of the Holy Spirit. God wants us to remember who we were and from whence we came, so that we might grow and mature into the loving and compassionate people God longs for us to be. God wants us to be a people who remember and a people who act.

Let's be honest. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America is an immigrant church. Many of our ancestors came to this country to seek a better life for their children and grand-children. Some came to avoid war and poverty. Some came to experience religious freedom. Some were brought to this country against their will. The hopes and dreams of our ancestors continue to live in us, just as our hopes and dreams continue to live in those who will follow us. As the people of God in this place and time, I ask us to prayerfully ponder what kind of a legacy we long to leave our children and grand-children. My prayer is that we leave a legacy of faith, compassion, and love.

As many of you know, the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America met in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, from August 5-10, for its triennial Churchwide Assembly. We worshiped, prayed, and studied Scripture. We re-elected our Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton to a second six-year term. We celebrated the 50th Anniversary of the Ordination of Women. On August 7, we adopted a resolution that the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America become a "sanctuary church body". The language of the resolution is as follows:

To reaffirm the long-term and growing commitment of this church to migrants and refugees and to the policy questions involved, as exemplified most recently in the comprehensive strategy Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities (AMMPARO);

*To recognize that the ELCA in congregations, synods and the churchwide organization are already taking the actions requested by this memorial; and

- *To request that appropriate staff on the AMMPARO team, Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services LIRS and the Domestic Mission, Global Mission, and Mission Advancement units review the existing strategies and practices by the five current sanctuary synods and develop a plan for additional tools that provide for education and discernment around sanctuary; and
- *The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America declares itself a sanctuary church body; and
- *To request the ELCA Church Council, in consultation with the appropriate churchwide units and offices, provide guidance for the three expressions of this church about what it means to be a sanctuary church body and provide a report to the 2022 Churchwide Assembly.

This resolution has fostered a lot of interest, debate, and critique among us. Some in our church body are delighted at this news. Some are apprehensive and concerned. Some are angry. Some have spoken out in ways that do not reflect the love of Jesus. I encourage us to reflect the light and love of Jesus in our words and deeds.

As we prayerfully consider the "sanctuary church body" resolution that was passed on August 7, a few points of clarification of "what does this mean" and "what does this not mean" may be helpful.

What does this mean?

- We will continue to seek God's guidance through God's Word, prayer, and faithful discernment and deliberation.
- We will continue our long history of working with immigrants and helping to resettle refugees through Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services
- We will continue to learn from those in our church who are working directly with migrants and refugees
- We will await the development of educational resources that will help our congregations and the people
 of God grow in our Biblical and theological understanding of serving migrants and refugees
- We will await the report of the ELCA Church Council (due in 2022) that will offer guidance and definition related to this "sanctuary church body" resolution

What does this not mean?

- The Churchwide Assembly's declaration that the ELCA is a sanctuary denomination binds only the ELCA Churchwide Organization; it does not bind congregations, synods, or other organizations. Congregations, synods, and ministries cannot be mandated or directed to respond in specific ways.
- The Churchwide Assembly did not call for any illegal actions, all actions approved by the Churchwide Assembly are legal, and whether any person or organization chooses to engage in civil disobedience (and therefore accept the consequences) is up to them.
- The Churchwide Assembly did not define what it means to be a sanctuary denomination, but rather requested that the ELCA Church Council provide guidance and resources for what it means to be a sanctuary denomination in 2022.

My prayer for our church is that we continue to follow Jesus in our love for God and for neighbor. And that the Holy Spirit will continue to stretch and grow us to become the people God longs for us to be.

Give justice...

About a month ago Psalm 82 was the appointed psalm in the lectionary. As we studied it with our pastors' group on Tuesday the leader for that week shared a commentary in which modern-day theologian, Clint McCann, who is a professor at Eden Theological Seminary in St. Louis, claims that Psalm 82 is "the single most important text" in the entire Bible. This intrigued me so I read more, first of all by reading the psalm...

God has taken his place in the divine council; in the midst of the gods he holds judgment:

"How long will you judge unjustly and show partiality to the wicked?

Give justice to the weak and the orphan; maintain the right of the lowly and the destitute.

Rescue the weak and the needy; deliver them from the hand of the wicked."


They have neither knowledge nor understanding, they walk around in darkness; all the foundations of the earth are shaken.

I say, "You are gods, children of the Most High, all of you; nevertheless, you shall die like mortals, and fall like any prince."

Rise up, O God, judge the earth; for all the nations belong to you!

McCann wrote that according to Psalm 82, what it means to be God--what characterizes divinity-is to protect and provide for the lives of the most vulnerable, not by offering charitable handouts but
rather by what Hossfeld and Zenger call "comprehensive alteration in social and political conditions"--in
a word <u>justice</u>, understood systematically as transformative opposition to "the hand" or "the power" of
oppressors, named here by the repeated term "the wicked."

The bottom line is that God provides justice as a transformative opposition to the wicked and as God's children we are called to provide justice also. Where we see wicked in the world, where we see evil in the world, we are called to provide justice to those who are vulnerable.



As the drawing depicts, equality is not the same as justice. As we desire to see justice in this world let us join with the psalmist praying, Rise up, O God, judge the earth; for all the nations belong to you!

Until next time, may the peace and healing of God be with you all.

Summary of the August 20, 2019 - Parish Planning Council Meeting

President Donna Thomas opened the meeting, and Deacon Kevin Kehn led the devotions based on Isaiah 6, Jeremiah 1, and Ezekiel 2 & 3, and Pastor Mark Schuring shared Holy Communion with the PPC.

Treasurer's Report -Ed Stofcheck reported that by the end of July the treasury had a positive balance of \$523.87. In order to reach this positive balance, they augmented the treasury with funds from the Jerew fund and other accounts.

Report from Pastor Mark Schuring - Pastor Mark stated that he had a busy month.

Report from Deacon Kevin Kehn -Kevin Kehn shared several dates with the PPC. He reported that the Luke 14 Dinner is August 27, and the Synod Day of Prayer will take place in Tiffin on November 6. The Fall Gathering with the Bishop will be October 6 in Bucyrus. He will be leading a book study on <a href="https://doi.org/10.2007/jhc.200

Reports from Administrative Boards -

Child Care - Amy Pirnstill said Child Care had a positive balance for July of \$121.51. The Child Care Board will man the Popcorn Festival Parking Lot on Thursday, September 4. The pie sale will take place in October, the annual Book Fair is scheduled for December 6-15, and the Christmas Program will be December 13. They are exploring the possibility of noisy offerings. The Preschool is looking for more space so they can increase the enrollment from 8 to 12 students. Tanyce Addison will discuss this possibility with the Child Care Board.

Communications/Evangelism - Daryl Kraner stated that they will begin a trial usage of ID name badges. For the first few weeks, they will use stick on name tags to see if the congregation will buy in to using name badges. Donna Thomas will talk to this board about organizing a volunteer committee to create a new church directory.

Education - Dianne Schuring reported that their board used the last meeting as a dream session. Rally Day is September 15 and Sunday School begins soon.

Fellowship - Andrea Ciola thanked the PPC for providing food for the Gathering Space refreshments. The Fellowship Board will host a potluck on Anniversary Sunday, September 8, with an Around the World theme.

Finance - Paula Burnside reported that the church accounts are in good standing. Consecration Sunday will be October 13, 2019.

Properties -Jim Conway asked the PPC to make a motion to obtain estimates for the replacement of the church roof. Tom Schifer has contacted 4 companies to give estimates. Paula Burnside made a motion that the Board of Properties obtain estimates to repair/replace the sanctuary roof. Rex Parrott seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Social Ministry - Betty Jo Lill stated that 200 backpacks were taken to McKinley Elementary School for distribution. The Gods Work, Our Hands outreach will begin September 8, and 18 different projects will be posted in the Gathering Space beginning September 29. Beginning Tuesday, September 10, Epworth UMC will organize a free community meal to be held the second Tuesday of each month at Trinity Baptist Church. This will replace the free meal that was held at St Paul's Episcopal Church. Epworth will provide the meal every other month and are looking for other congregations to fill in the other six dates. The meals cannot be prepared at Trinity so the food needs to be brought into the church ready to serve. Spiritual Life - Cindy Strzalka read a welcome to parents of children and the congregation. They plan to laminate this Welcome and The Welcome PPC voted on at last meeting and place them in the pews, as well as providing them at other events and locations around the church.

Paula Burnside moved to accept the secretary's report, the treasurer's report, and all board reports, and Rick Varner seconded the motion. Motion approved.

Old Business - none

New Business - President Donna Thomas introduced Bishop Daniel Beaudoin of the NW Ohio Synod. The Synod has an exciting opportunity for Emanuel to participate in. He explained the TEEM (Theological Education for Emerging Ministries) Program as a pathway for select candidates to complete three years of theological coursework while serving in a congregation. At the end of the three years of successful training, the candidates earn a Certificate of Ordination. Five exceptional individuals have been identified in our synod, and Parish Deacon Tanyce Addison has been selected.

The synod is asking the sponsoring congregation to provide one third of the cost of tuition. Rex Parrott talked with Ed Baldauf about using funds from the Agnes Baldauf Seminary Fund to pay Emanuel's portion of the tuition.

Pastor Mark Schuring and Pastor Adam Sornchai will be her mentors. While participating in the TEEM Program, Tanyce will be able to administer the Sacraments of Baptism and Communion. Bishop Beaudoin hopes Emanuel will become a strong anchor congregation, reaching out to smaller congregations in the area to share ministry opportunities.

Amy Pirnstill made the following motion – I move that the PPC schedule a congregational meeting to accept Parish Deacon Tanyce Addison into the TEEM Program and provide financial and spiritual support though the completion of the program. Dianne Schuring seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Consecration Sunday Is Coming - October 13

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

There is no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship Pastor Mark will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

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A Message from Emanuel's Women of The Church -- taken from "Lessons for Today's Disciples" a resource of Women of the ELCA.

"Worshipping God Is A Mark Of Discipleship" based on John 4:19-26.

Worshiping God builds and strengthens a disciple's connection to and relationship with both God and the community of faith. Let's reflect on the importance of true worship. Sometimes true worship is confused with the habit of "going to church." There is also the popular belief that an individual can worship sufficiently alone. However, Jesus, the Son of God, made worship central in His life and ministry (Luke 4:16). Jesus' example makes any rationale or excuse for not coming to worship meaningless or self-serving. Worshiping God in community was a regular practice in the lives of Jesus' disciples. Read John 4:19-26. This story picks up in the middle of Jesus' conversation with the Samaritan woman at the well. After a rousing round of riddles about water, the conversation shifts to an even deeper subject—worship. The Samaritan woman brings it up in an attempt to change the subject and move the spotlight away from her, but Jesus tells her that "the hour is coming" when worshiping God will not be focused on a particular location but centered in the way in which we worship God, in spirit and truth. Worshiping God with a genuine and sincere heart is what is most important.

*Reflect on how the Holy Spirit inspires you to worship. Next, review verses 17-20. Think about the phrase "in spirit and truth." What happens when your deepest hurts or needs connect with worship? Just like the Samaritan woman, you may have strong beliefs about worship. What are some common worship practices in your congregation that may cause tension or bring healing?_ When it comes to worship, I need to work on ...
