⁴Though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I shall fear no evil; for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me. (Psalm 23)

This spring I was invited by a member of our congregation to read a book by JR Briggs entitled, <u>A Time to Heal</u>, <u>Offering Hope to a Wounded World in the Name of Jesus</u>. He wrote it in response to the Covid 19 pandemic noting that pain and suffering have always been part of the human condition and that now, more than ever, we need healers – people who are willing to help others heal from the wounds the world has endured. His book offers a hope-filled vision for how everyday Christians can join with God in the healing of our world and become a movement of wounded healers in our time. The time for healing is now. Jesus is at working bringing the healing life of the kingdom. Will we join him?

As I read I took notes, realizing that what I was reading was indeed worth sharing. So over the next few newsletters I will be sharing with you the highlights of JR Briggs' book, <u>A Time to Heal</u>. I hope you find these thoughts of value in your faith walk.

The first element of Christian understanding is to unabashedly acknowledge that we cannot avoid suffering in our human condition and the Christian story actually teaches us that suffering can serve a greater purpose and deeper meaning beyond our immediate existence. Rather than asking in our suffering, why is this happening to me and when will it end, we should ask what is it that God might be wanting to show us through our experiences. In other words, where can our faith and hope deepen in our suffering. We are reminded in Psalm 23, and other places, that we are not alone in our suffering, that God accompanies us. Furthermore, suffering is most meaningful when others join us in it and suffering is most meaningful and bearable when it is embedded in knowing the suffering of Jesus.

As we read the gospels we will find that there are more verses about Jesus healing than any other experience, including salvation. There are 72 times when Jesus heals--physical, mental, emotional and spiritual illness, and raising from the dead. This was the mission of Jesus, a mission of shalom, restoring, redeeming and renewing of the world to peace, righteousness and harmony. In Numbers 21 we read of healing as Moses made a serpent of bronze and put it upon a pole and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live. In John 3 Jesus reminds us of this as he offers Nicodemus and all believers eternal life.

The church is now called to be hospital of hope, to notice pain and look to aid in healing. Christopher Wright wrote, It is not so much that God has a mission for his church in the world, but that God has a church for his mission in the world.

In his book, Briggs points us to the Greek word, *sozo*, which means to save, to deliver, to rescue from danger or deliver from evil and to heal. From this we can equate that saving is healing and healing is saving. We are reminded that in the healing stories in the gospels not only does healing restore the physical state, but also the emotional state and communal standing--healing the whole person

One final thought for this newsletter comes from Christian hip-hop artist, activist and author Lecrae who said, *Wounds help us know we're not alone, scars help us know we can heal.*

Looking back with Alicia Mayes ...

This is the 2nd half of the piece I started in the June-July Newsletter about the Radio Ministry here at Emanuel.

"Yes, Raymond sang on the afternoon program and I accompanied him....That afternoon program went on for many years....Once our choir appeared in an outdoor concert and it was broadcast on this program....In fact, I remember the time Raymond surprised his wife by singing on the air "Sweet Little Woman O' Mine."

"WMRN went on the air in 1940 and Emanuel Lutheran Church began broadcasting on January 31, 1943. It was actually a 13 week trial basis as some felt the broadcasts would hurt church attendance. But, this soon proved that it not only did not hurt church attendance, but attendance continued to increase. At the end of the 13 weeks the Vestry decided to assume the responsibility of Radio Broadcasting as a mission to shut-ins....Letters from listeners have been received from as far away as Columbus and other communities in a fifty mile radius of Marion....Many visitors have come to worship and mentioned that they listened to the radio every Sunday....Many others continue to support the broadcasts with their checks to insure its continuation....The Christmas Eve service has been broadcast almost as long as the Sunday services....Special services expanded the time on the air to include Confirmation, dedication services, etc. In the past year some of the Lenten services have now been included on the radio schedule....It was in 1960 that the church purchased and installed new public address equipment as well as new microphones and the radio station hooked its equipment into the new system....From time to time the microphones were added to until there are now 14 in use some Sundays....And, two years ago the church purchased and installed new Public Address equipment and a new permanent set-up is available for not only the Public Address System but the Radio Broadcasts as well." I hope you've enjoyed reading these statements shared with you by people who have been involved in the development of our radio ministry these 35 years. In fact, Mrs. Roecker shared with me a recording of the 25th anniversary in 1968 and a copy of that ceremony is now in the church files for permanent record. Emanuel not only agreed to not plead for funds over the air but continues to support these broadcasts without pleading for funds even within its own membership. We have a phenomenal record of continuing support from members and friends who listen to the broadcasts, appreciate their ministry, and recognize their benefit for the whole community, and then contribute through offerings in memory and honor of loved ones. This is the commitment which keeps us "on the air." And, we have shared the Gospel through broadcasts of our Sunday morning service now for 35 years, 1,820 consecutive Sundays, and one-third of our total ministry. The important measure of our radio ministry coming in the hospital room, the home of the shut-in, and when the sounds of our choirs and our words are heard ringing through the hallways of so many near-by rest homes on any given Sunday morning. We shall continue to broadcast and continue to expand our ministry by radio. God's word is powerful and "shall not return void" as long as it is proclaimed to the world with authority and zeal. Our radio broadcast continues to grow in popularity as measured by constant growth in financial support, letters which come in, and comments heard. God has blessed this ministry and we pray it will continue to be a blessing. In Christ, Pastor Rave

Something you might be interested to know, the radio broadcast in 1949 cost \$2600 a year. Today the broadcasts are \$8140 a year.

The Board of Spiritual Life would like to thank you for your patience during COVID-19. While it is not completely over, steps are being taken when possible to get back to normal at our church. Following CDC and other government guidelines we are gradually reopening. This Board has been together for three years and we have experienced the good, the bad and the ugly. We know it is impossible to please everyone every time, but we do the best we can. We have met every month for the past three years except for the first month when the Pandemic shut everything down. Our meetings can sometimes be intense given the tasks and responsibilities we have, but we always end our meetings in a good place and with decisions we are all comfortable with pertaining to the people of our church as a whole. While conflict is never good it can also be healthy if everyone is willing to consider why things sometimes have to change, and remember our main reason is to come together as one to give thanks to God for all we have and all we are able to do.

As of June 13, 2021 if you are fully vaccinated you no longer have to wear a mask in the Sanctuary. When meeting in groups the same will apply. We trust that if you are not vaccinated you will follow government guidelines and continue wearing your mask as this protects you and especially others who are not vaccinated as well. We are also, as of June 01, 2021, offering three different options for worship; Thursday evenings at 7:00 p.m., Sunday mornings at 9:15 for contemporary worship and 10:30 for traditional worship. We are currently discontinuing the 8:00 a.m. Sunday worship service, as it has been increasingly difficult to find help for three worship services on a Sunday morning. Our number of worshipers has decreased and we still have no knowledge of how the Pandemic will affect how many people return to church and when. Please bear with us as we see our way out of this pandemic, just as all of you are considering how to resume life moving forward.


Hope defined
