where Is God Calling Us to Go?

(Jesus said) "But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

Acts of the Apostles 1:8

In 2022, we started this intentional process by asking ourselves, "Who Is God Calling Us to Be?" Last year, we focused our attention on, "What Is God Calling Us to Do?" Now in 2024, we will look at "Where Is God Calling Us to Go?"

We hear Jesus in this passage in Acts. He tells those present that they will be his witnesses. Jesus then sends them to four different areas: Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth. These are four different areas of influence; four different places; four different types of people; and at least four different ways of completing the mission.

Jerusalem is their local area – the community where they live. Judea is the larger region that includes people who are mostly like them. Samaria is a place that is farther out, people who are not like them, a place that is believed to be filled with people that they may despise, maybe even their enemies. The ends of the earth is just that – all over the world.

Where is God sending us? Where is our Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria and ends of the earth? Who are our Jerusalemites, Judeans, Samaritans, foreigners? How might our ministries change as we walk with people in those categories?

As we celebrate our 150th year, we continue to discern what God has in store for us in the next 150 years. Let's keep this question in our minds: Where Is God Calling Us to Go?

Proverbs 6:16-19

There are six things that the LORD hates, seven that are an abomination to him: haughty eyes, a lying tongue, and hands that shed innocent blood, a heart that devises wicked plans, feet that hurry to run to evil, a lying witness who testifies falsely, and one who sows discord in a family.

SINS, sins and deadly sins! What ever happened to Sin? We are losing our theological footing. We are losing the ability to talk about SIN as a condition. Culture is reducing "sin" to specific unsavory actions committed by "bad people." SIN no longer seems to be something that is a part of all of us. We don't follow criminal trials to discover how people are just like us. We do this to assure ourselves that they are different from us.¹

We deal with sin by eliminating the sinners. Television and social media give us examples to follow. Criminals are brought to justice as a way of affirming the popular notion that evil rests primarily in evil people, not in the human race. That is what we are up against, the trivialization of SIN by relegating it to "bad acts by bad people", rather than using it as a description of the human condition. We need to take a greater ownership of our own sinfulness. We also need to have a greater and clearer hope of our own salvation.

Let's take a stab at defining SIN. What are some of the biblical images of sin: missing the target, wandering the path, straying from the fold, having a hard heart, a stiff neck, blindness, deafness, overstepping the line, failure to reach a goal, a beast crouching at the door, separation (estrangement from God, ourselves, and others), fallen-ness, disobedience against God's will, brokenness (in relationships with God, self and others), bad or wrong choices, missing the mark, something that deserves blame. At the heart sin is a failure to trust God. This is the essence of it all. Sin is misplaced trust. Sin is the breaking of shalom.

The understanding of shalom is more than just peace. It is the right ordering of all things. Everything is in proper relationship. All of creation, and everything in it, is the way God intended it to be. Anything that is not contributing to the way God intended all creation to be, is breaking shalom.

We also have to look at a couple of different categories. Let's look at SIN: big "S," big "I," big "N," SIN! This is the universal fact which is the tragedy of human existence. This is what we can't get away from. Then we have sin and sins: particular actions that result in SIN.

There has been a long tradition of the deadly sins. Remember that the number "7" symbolically means completeness: "3" represents the spirit realm and "4" represents the earthly realm. The first list of sins that we get are the Ten Commandments, found in two places, Exodus 20:2-17 and Deuteronomy 5:6-21. We have the list as found in the Proverbs 6:16-18 reading. The apostle Paul has several vice lists in his writings. The extra-canonical book, "Shepherd of Hermes" (cir. 148ce) gives us a list of 12 sins. Augustine (345-430ce) gives us 15. Evargrius of Pontus, a 4th Century Egyptian monk lists 8. Gregory the Great (540-604ce) gives us 8. The church in medieval times settled on 7, to match the number of days in a week. Each day had a corresponding sin: Sunday – Pride (combated by worshipping God on the Sabbath), Monday – Envy (a violation of personal worth and dignity, a continuation of the struggle with pride), Tuesday – Anger, Wednesday – Sloth (being the farthest from Sunday worship with past or coming, most susceptible to spiritual indifference), Thursday – Greed (self-indulgence flowing from the previous day's loss of spiritual fortitude), Friday – Gluttony, and Saturday – Lust (most self-indulgent, deadliest when effects from previous Sunday's worship are at their lowest).

How can we possibly understand sin? First, we must remember that sin involves lies, deceit, and the denial of truth. It seems that sin is irrational. Sin and evil are hard to distinguish. The disordering of what God has ordered (shalom) involves perversion, pollution, and disintegration. Sin is a parasite. Sin is glamorous and attractive.

There are two sides to each of the seven deadly sins; full and empty. There are two ditches along the road of faithfulness, one on each side that we can fall into which is called sin. For instance, look at gluttony. It can either be eating everything you see, or you starve yourself by eating nothing. Either way, the in-taking of nourishment into your body, or lack thereof, is the root of sinful behavior. With pride, one can either be over the top with their self-promotion, or one can be totally depraved about their situation. Anger is either explosive or one is totally passive. We find that sin and evil can be placed on a continuum. We can have anxiety (out of control) or shame (certain finitude). We can be either unfaithful (inability to trust God) or have a misdirected trust (placing our trust in something other than God). We have pride (raising oneself to a divine level) or self-negation (breaking ourselves down to the lowest level). We prove our position (self-justification) or deflect responsibility (scapegoating). We allow our animal nature to overindulge in ordinary life or we have an unlimited devotion to limited values. We will either steal power for our own, or align our interests with what we claim are God's interests.

We should look at the seven deadly sins as attitudes. They are not actions or deeds; but they are habits, dispositions or characteristics that influence how we act. They tend to be good things that have gone badly. Pride is a self-confidence gone too far. Sloth is making every day a Sabbath. Gluttony is taking a month's worth of daily bread at one time. Lust is an inappropriate love. Sin doesn't always look bad. What makes behavior sinful is that the good is sought in ways that are hurtful. They are disordered loves. We love the wrong objects, or at an inappropriate depth or at an improper intensity. Shame and guilt come into play with sin. Guilt is believing we have done something wrong or bad. Shame is believing that we ourselves are a bad person. We have shame with sin. Shame is worrying how someone else looks at us or what someone else will say to us. We also have guilt with sin. Guilt is having the knowledge in our mind of what is right or wrong, good or bad, a yes or a no.

What does the Bible teach us about sin? Our order of confession in worship uses the words that we are in bondage to sin, in our thoughts, words, and deeds. We have to take a look at our sin face-to-face, to truly see that hold it has on us. We have to admit and confess our sins. The phrase that comes out of the Reformation is that we are "simul justis et peccator", we are simultaneously sinner and saved. We are called to look at our sins through the cross of Christ, the cross that bore our sins. The blood through which all of our sins are forgiven.

Faith Journeys



Journey through the Bible Together

Part 7 of Emanuel's history:

In early 1974 plans continued to make the former church parsonage the new church offices and to remodel the old offices.

Two bids were received for the remodeling of the former offices and lounge into a chapel/library/lounge. Steward Construction Company with a bid of \$18,200 and Clifford Danner with a bid of \$20,875. The contract was awarded to Steward Construction.

A committee was formed for each of the new areas. Decorating Committee: Bill Barnhart, Chairman, Mary Naher, Patsy Howard, and Opal Kline. Library: John Kyle, Chairman, Kay Pennington, Bernice Petrich, Judy Bolinger, Elaine Merchant, and Donna Ruth Fogt. The architect for the project would be Warren Callahan.

In April of 1974 the Marion County Historical Society requested permission to add Emanuel's Church building to their tour to be held on Sunday, May 5th to be called "Heritage Sunday". Also, they requested that we provide hosts and hostesses at Emanuel to greet guests and have the Centennial Historical Committee provide pertinent information to present to visitors. We were just included in the tour of churches by Aspire this past December.



PASTOR AUGENSTEIN

At the church council meeting December 11, 1974 Pastor Augenstein answered questions in regards to his call from St. Paul Lutheran Church in Evart, Michigan. He asked for prayers for a decision and said he would announce his decision in two weeks. At the January 8, 1975 council meeting Pastor Augenstein announced that he had accepted the call from the congregation of St. Paul's Lutheran Church and reported that Sunday, January 19th would be his last day at Emanuel. It was decided to have a reception for Pastor Augenstein following the 8A and 10:30A services on January 19th.

As I was looking through the year-end report for 1974 and then looked at the one for 2022 for the utility budgets, it is astounding the differences. Here is a sample: electricity, \$4,000 budgeted for 1974 and for 2022, \$18,000. Water, \$500 budgeted for 1974 and \$2,100 for 2022. What a difference but we must remember inflation over 48 years. We can see that in our own homes. These are facts I find interesting.

It was decided in February of 1975 to hire Dennis Proux as an assistant pastor through May, 1975 to help with duties at the church after Pastor Augenstein's departure. Dennis accepted the position of Student Assistant and would serve two days per week through May. The Call Committee would be working to decide who best to call as permanent associate pastor to present to the congregation.

Also at the February meeting Church Council accepted the resignation of Elizabeth Curren, part-time bookkeeper.

At the February 19th council meeting it was reported that a Call Committee be formed to decide the wording of the Call for a new associated pastor. Special consideration should be given to the Youth Ministry in that call.

At the April church council meeting the Call Committee presented a printed resume of the two pastors who were candidates for the position of Associate Pastor for Emanuel. Those pastors were, Rev. Jeffrey K. Kimpel and Rev. Henry C. Seibert, plus a verbal report on Seminary candidate, Roger S. Lawrence of Fremont, Ohio. It was decided that the Call Committee was to make their decision and present it to Church Council for approval at a special meeting to be held in one week, April 16th and then present to the congregation for approval at the special meeting on April 27th.

At the Special Council Meeting April 16th Pastor Rave reported that he had interviewed all three candidates for 3 or 4 hours and the Call Committee had visited the congregations of both pastors. It was decided that the call should go to Rev. Henry C. Seibert. The recommendation would now go to the congregation for approval at the meeting Sunday, April 27th.




PASTOR RAVE

The Special Congregational Meeting was held Sunday, April 27th. John Lodwig, chair of the Call Committee presented for congregational approval the unanimous choice of the committee to issue the call to Henry Seibert, pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Coldwater, Ohio. The congregation voted unanimously to call Rev. Seibert.

In May of 1975 Church Council was shown by the Board of Trustees models of stained glass window and door glasses for the chapel prepared and designed exclusively for Emanuel by the Franklin Art Glass Studios in German Village in Columbus. The window model depicts the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and the door windows depict ways of serving the Lord in Worship, Jobs, and Sharing and Helping our Fellow-man. Franklin Art Glass will celebrate their 100th anniversary this year.

Rev. Seibert was installed, Sunday, June 22, 1975 at the 10:30 service. He was introduced at the 8A service and a reception was held after each service. The installing pastor was Tom Von Fischer, assistant to the District President and preached at both services.



There was an organ committee formed in July 1975 for selecting an organ for the new chapel that would be finished soon. Jack Lewis was chairman of that committee along with Beverly Quaintance (the organist at that time) and Junior Denzer, members.

Also in July 1975 it was announced at the Church Council meeting that Ed Littleton had resigned as janitor and Dwight Dutton had been hired by the Trustees.

It was reported at the August 1975 Council Meeting that an organ had been found by the organ committee for the new chapel. The Rogers organ was valued at \$5,700 and we were given a special price of \$4,700. The purchase of the furnishings for the new library, lounge, and chapel along with the purchase of the organ were approved.

Pastor Rave announced at the September Church Council meeting that there was a group of traveling young musicians, "The New Kingsmen" who were touring the country for the Evangelism Department of the American Lutheran Church giving their testimony for Jesus Christ. He asked that council consider having them come to Emanuel and present a Saturday evening concert on Saturday, October 4th. That request was approved by council. Some of you may remember that concert.

The sound system in the church sanctuary was being reviewed in an effort to have a proper sound level was reported at Church Council in September 1975. They were looking into the purchase of a Lavalier Microphone (lapel mic) for the pastors.

Also at the September 1975 council meeting it was reported that Mike's Roofing was putting a new roof on the north tower of the church. Items for the 1976 budget would include a new roof on the church sanctuary and remodeling the church parlor.

With the gifts and memorials received from the congregation and the money left in the Galen Carter Estate the new Chapel/Library/Lounge plans were financially sound. Total cost was \$40,690 and the total income from the Carter Estate, memorials and honorariums was \$42,382.

The Dedication Service and Open House for the Chapel/Library/Lounge was October 26, 1975.

It was reported at the December 1975 Church Council meeting that Ron Steward was in the process of ridding the sanctuary of pigeons and would install heavy screening over their entrance site. There you have it, we have had pigeons AND bats in the sanctuary.



Also at the December meeting it was announced that the Bethel Bible Series Study would be starting on January 13, 1976. This was for the members that wanted to lead the series. These leaders would complete the study in October of 1977 and then be ready for participants from the congregation to start the series.

It was also reported that the Senior Bible Class was now meeting in the new chapel on Sunday mornings. If you remember that class met in the chapel and then the lounge for many years.

Introducing Guest Pastor Jonathan D. Bull

Jonathan Bull was born February 3, 1965. His parents are Glada and Jack Bull. Many of you remember Glada and Jack. Jack died November 4, 2023 and Glada, February 23, 2014. Jon was raised at Emanuel with his brother, Joe, and his sister, Jane. Jane died September 28, 1974 at the age of 13.



He was baptized March 21, 1965 by Rev. Martin Hollensen and confirmed April 22, 1979 by Pastor James Rave. His confirmation picture will be on the display table in the Gathering Space.

Jon married Terry Krueger on May 27, 1989. Jon and Terry have 2 adult children, Michael Bull practices law in Hilliard, Ohio and Sarah works for the ELCA Mission Investment Fund. She is engaged to Isaac Samuelson and will be married February 15, 2025.

Jon graduated from Capital University with a BA in Business Administration in 1988. He then went to Trinity Lutheran Seminary and graduated in 1992 with a Master of Divinity degree. He was ordained on June 28, 1992 by Bishop James A. Rave. It is good to see he was confirmed and ordained by the same person.

Pastor Bull has served Zion Lutheran in St. Marys from 1992-1996, St. John's in Fremont from 1996-2000, David, Canal Winchester from 2000 to 2001, First in Bellefontaine from 2001-2015, and in 2015 went to St. Paul Lutheran in Westerville where he still presides.

Pastor Jon serves on the Southern Ohio Synod Finance Committee and Global Mission Task Force. He is a member of the Westerville Area Resource Ministry Board of Directors and, on behalf of the Westerville Division of Fire and Police, serves as Chaplain Coordinator for the Westerville Safety Service Chaplains.

The rest I will write in Pastor Jon's own words: I have fond memories of Emanuel Lutheran Church. Emanuel played an essential role from Sunday School and VBS to Luther League, the Youth Gathering, and many life events.

One year during VBS, we played kickball in the west parking lot. Why the adults had us playing with a soccer ball, I do not know. I was at the plate and kicked a beautiful ball that sailed and broke the second floor window of the house directly north. Carl Campbell owned that house. He commented that the window needed to be replaced.

Chad Bollinger, Jack Rowland, and I used to leave worship (8 AM) after communion and walk to Huddle's bakery. We missed a good portion of Sunday School. We always brought donuts back to everyone. This gesture, I am confident, saved us from being in trouble.

Emanuel has been a place where my family has felt God's love as we said goodbye to my sister, grandparents, and parents.

Pastor Jon is taking part in our 150th Anniversary Year celebration and was here at Emanuel January 28th.

Welcome to the February Music Notes!



Great day! God's going to build up Zion's walls! Great day! Great day, the righteous marching; Great day! God's going to build up Zion's walls!

As I do every February, in celebration of Black History Month, I will play organ music based on Spirituals and compositions by black composers. I hope that you will enjoy this special month of music, and that it will serve as witness that we are All God's Children: One People, Created in God's Image. Many Spirituals are familiar, as we have sung them or heard them since we were children. Or perhaps we have grown up singing, "Let Us Break Bread Together" or, "Go, Tell It on the Mountain" in Church or Sunday School, perhaps not realizing they were Spirituals!

Interestingly, according to the Library of Congress, "the term 'spiritual' is derived from the King James Bible translation of Ephesians 5:19: 'Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord.'" Spirituals are religious folksongs associated with enslaved African people in the American South, and proliferated from the final decades of the 18th century until emancipation. I don't have the space here to give a history of spirituals, but there are many wonderful books, websites, and other resources available for more information.

One name that you will see frequently in the Prelude Notes in the Sunday bulletin in February is the African American composer Adolphus Hailstork (b. 1941). He is one of the most prolific American composers working today. Best known for his band, choral, and orchestral works, he has also written song cycles, chamber works, and compositions for solo piano and organ.

His organ works are rhythmically complex, but accessible. Based mostly on familiar hymn tunes or spirituals, the melody is sometimes "implied" rather than explicit. His interpretations can be powerful and challenging, while others are melodic and fragile. They are modern with light dissonance, but also traditional in form and structure. Those of you who regularly read my Music Notes know that I am interested in music that challenges the mind and the senses. Hailstork's music satisfies this criterion, and is always interesting and fun to play. I hope you enjoy listening to his music as well.

There is one piece of important business that I have been remiss to mention previously. A couple months ago the Emanuel Music Department was pleased to welcome the donation of a new piano! Many years ago, Jim and Kathy Stroupe donated a wonderful piano to St. Paul's Lutheran as a memorial, which I enjoyed playing during my years there. With the closing of St. Paul's, Kathy generously agreed to donate the piano to Emanuel. The Stroupe piano has replaced the rehearsal piano in the choir room, and it sounds and plays great! A special "Thank You!" is in order to Mike Phillips and his crew for transporting the piano to Emanuel!

So, if you, or anyone you know, is interested in the former choir room piano, please let me know. We still have it, but will be disposing of it in the next couple months. Just let me know, or contact the office and they will pass on a message. It is free, but transport arrangements would need to be made.

I will leave you this month with the first two verses of the Spiritual, "Great Day!."

Chariot rode on the mountain top, God's going to build up Zion's walls! My God spoke and the chariot did stop, God's goin' to build up Zion's walls! [Refrain] This is the day of jubilee, God's going to build up Zion's walls! The Lord has set His people free, God's going to build up Zion's walls! [Refrain]
