
So, as we start a new year, let us fulfill our identity as children of God, and be who God is calling us to be.

### PD Corner- Ann Thomas

I had trouble coming up with a topic for this article until I discovered an idea in a notebook I keep with ideas for sermons, articles or just because I like the thought. Here is the statement I found by an unknown author: "I asked Jesus why He was taking me through troubled waters. He said because your enemies cannot swim. Isaiah 43:2-3b states, "When you pass through the waters, I will be with you, and when you pass through the rivers, they will not sweep over you. When you walk through the fire, you will not be burned; the flames will not set you ablaze. For I am the Lord your God, the Holy one of Israel, your Savior." Remember when Moses was leading the Hebrew people out of Egypt, they crossed the Red Sea, but Pharoah and his army drowned in the water. They could not swim (Exodus 14).

You may wonder why we have to face the sudden death of loved ones, the closing of a nursing home that has been home for friends and families for many years, the closing of a store that has served the community, and overwhelming financial or health problems. Maybe we need to look at these troubled waters a different way. Peter started looking at Jesus and walked on water. Then Peter looked down at the water and he began to drown. He took his eyes off Jesus.



Where are your eyes looking? Deuteronomy 10 provides these words: "For the Lord your God is God of gods and Lord of lords, the great God, mighty and awesome...he defends the cause of the fatherless and the widow and loves the alien residing among you, giving him food and clothing...Fear the Lord your god and serve him. Hold fast to him...He is the one you praise; He is your God who performed for you those great and awesome wonders you saw with your own eyes." Keeping your eyes focused on our great God, his son Jesus and with the power of the Holy Spirit you will not drown. What a great focus no matter what troubled waters you face now or in the new year. Remember your enemies can't swim!

### Watchwords for 2023

On Sunday, January 8, 2023, as we gather to celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of Our Lord, we will draw Watchwords for 2023. Watchwords are verses of scripture that are offered up to give guidance and encouragement throughout the year. Watchwords are drawn for congregations, groups and individuals.

This Moravian practice of drawing Watchwords is traced back to 1722 in Herrnhut, Germany. The Worldwide Unity of the Moravian Church publishes <u>The Daily Text</u> which gives Watchwords for every day of the year. The process to select these passages is long and takes about 2-5 years to bring the passages to print each year. The Watchwords found in the Daily Text are then separated and chosen as guidance for the coming year.

So, we will have the opportunity to join this traditional practice as we continue our Faith Journeys in 2023.

# Advocacy in Advent Building a Beloved Community

In November, Pastor Poole and Donna Thomas were invited to join the Hunger Network in Ohio and the Ohio Council of Churches for Advocacy Day to engage our state lawmakers on important policy issues. After an update on policy issues facing our state legislators prior to the end of the year, our team of six was given appointments to meet with Senator Kuntz, Senator Reineke, Representative Richardson, Representative Liston, and Representative Russo.

We presented each of the legislators a packet of information concerning issues that affect the hungry and marginalized in Ohio. Among the issues we discussed were the use of Ohio's reserve of \$2 billion in the Federal American Resource Plan funds. We encouraged them to consider Affordable Housing, Universal School Meals, and Food Banks as priority needs for our families. We also encouraged a positive vote on Criminal Justice reform. That bill recently passed.

Our Advent Advocacy Day continued the following week with follow-up emails to the senators and representatives as well as the legislative leadership. There will be a spring advocacy day in a few months to address issues before the legislators at that time.



### Faith Journeys

The January Faith Journeys event will be a Prayer Retreat. On Saturday January 21<sup>st</sup>, 2023, from 9am – 4pm, we will explore a vast array of means of prayer. Some of the prayer topics we will discuss are: individual prayer, use of devotionals, corporate prayer in worship, icons, labyrinths, illuminated texts, sacred coloring as prayer, integrating movement into prayer, and the use of prayer beads. We will set up hands-on opportunities to explore the prayer techniques. And each participant will make their own set of prayer beads. ### Looking Back with Alicia Mayes

As I was looking through old bulletins, I came across an insert from a bulletin from September 28, 1952. The title on the insert reads, "Greatest Bible News in 341 Years". The insert was telling that the Revised Standard Version of the Bible is the newest translation. It was announced as the New, Easier to Read version of the bible September 30, 1952. It came in 3 editions, genuine leather, cloth, and a two volume, the Old and the New Testament. The cloth edition was \$6.00, leather \$10.00 and the 2-volume set was \$7.50.

This was published by Wartburg Press; the name was changed to 1517 Media in 2016. The name was inspired by the year the Lutheran Reformation began and carries the tagline, "Always Reforming." It is located in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

In my research of Wartburg Press, now named 1517 Media, I found there are 3 arms of 1517 Media, (1) Augsburg Fortress, (2) Fortress Press, and (3) Sparkhouse Publishing. The "Parent Company" of 1517 Media is the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Augsburg Fortress Fortress Press Sparkhouse

Augsburg Fortress, publishes resources for use by Lutheran congregations including music, books, and on-line services. Fortress Press publishes trade books, textbooks, monographs, and popular titles on theology. Sparkhouse publishes religious education curriculum.

In my research I also found Wartburg Lutheran College in Waverly, Iowa. It is a private, non-profit liberal arts college of the ELCA. All students admitted to the college get a minimum \$30,000 scholarship per year. The most popular majors are business administration, biology, psychology, elementary education, and exercise science. There are 1444 students in the college for the 2022-2023 school year. Wartburg College is ranked among the top tier of liberal arts colleges. There is also a campus called Wartburg West in Denver, Colorado.

I never know when I start researching a story what I will find. I just thought this was very interesting and thought you would too.

A final thought on Joy. Many of you have been concerned about why I am on the weekly prayer list. I don't really talk about it very much, but some of you know that I became disabled a number of years ago, with a vestibular disorder. Simply, I lost my sense of balance, equilibrium, and general well-being, and with it many aspects of everyday living that are taken for granted. As every day is a struggle for me in many ways, your prayers each week are a comfort, and remind me that I am blessed. I am blessed that I can still be a musician, that I have supportive, loving family and friends, that I have a home at Emanuel, that I have a good life, despite my limitations. But most of all, I am filled with Joy.
