Musings from the Church Mouse ...

Musings from the Church Mouse...

At the Ascension worship service, Pastor Mike talked about the three different Creeds. Do you wonder why we say one Creed or another? I do! The three Ecumenical Creeds we use are the Apostles' Creed, the Nicene Creed, and the Athanasian Creed. All three were in the green BLW. In the new cranberry ELW, they only printed the Apostles' and Nicene Creeds. And, they only put them in Setting One, and not in all the settings.

The Apostles' Creed comes to us as an ancient baptismal Creed. If we look at the questions and answers in the baptismal liturgy, we see that some of the answers to the questions are the three petitions of the Apostles' Creed. The Apostles' Creed gives us the three persons of the Trinity. The Apostles' Creed is also used typically when the color of the season/day is green.

The Nicene Creed explains the interconnectedness of the Trinity a little deeper. The Nicene Creed is typically used when we have a Feast/Festival of Jesus (when the color of the day is white); during the seasons of Advent (blue), Christmas (white), Lent and Holy Week (purple), and Easter (gold and white); on Pentecost and other days when the color of the day is red; and on other days when the color of the day is white (i.e. All Saints Day, Holy Trinity Sunday, ect.).

The Athanasian Creed is a long Creed that is a deeper explanation of the Trinity being a perfect loving relationship. The Athanasian Creed is not used very often. The one occasion we may use this Creed is on Holy Trinity Sunday.

YMCA Cornerstone Laying

In September of 1952 a letter was sent to Rev. Martin Hollensen, the pastor of Emanuel at that time, and the congregation from Al Kette, President of the Board of the YMCA, inviting everyone to the cornerstone laying of the new YMCA being built on E. Church St. This was to take place September 21, 1952. Emanuel was asked to place a copy of the Bible in their cornerstone.

In researching this I talked with Matt Primmer, since he is on the board of the YMCA now. He in turn took pictures of the contents of that cornerstone.

When the new YMCA on Barks Road was opened the contents were taken from the cornerstone on Church St. and are now at the new YMCA.

You can see the Bible and it is signed by Howard Swink and his wife, Martha, and dated the day the cornerstone was layed. Matt also sent me a copy of a newspaper piece that tells the names of members of the YMCA board in the 1950's. Howard Swink and his wife were members of Emanuel and he was a member of the board of the YMCA.

Thank you, Matt, for helping me with this piece.

Welcome to the July Music Notes!

This month, as we celebrate our nation's founding, I would like to highlight the July 3rd opening hymn which we will sing at the 8:00 and 10:30 services. "This Is My Song" (ELW 887) is a wonderful hymn with an interesting background. The first two verses were written by the musician and poet Lloyd Stone (1912-1993). Intending to become a teacher after graduating as a music major from USC, Lloyd

instead joined a circus on its way to Hawaii! Although he left the circus soon after, he remained in Hawaii, where he became a highly regarded musician and poet, and was named the Poet Laureate of Hawaii (Ka Haku-Mele O Hawaii) in 1951. His poem "This Is My Song" was written during the time of peace between the two world wars, and was a song of hope for all nations. In fact, in his poem he acknowledges not only the love he has for his own country, but the love of other nations by their citizens as well.

Lloyd's poem, set to Jean Sibelius' tune "Finlandia" (more on that later), was first published as "A Song For Peace," and by the late 1930s became a favorite of the Wesleyan Service Guild of the Methodist Church. In order to give the poem a more Christian character, the Guild asked Georgia Elma Harkness (1891-1974), a prominent Methodist theologian and philosopher, to give the poem a more Christian character. Thus Harkness wrote two additional stanzas, one of which is commonly included as the 3rd and final verse of the hymn. Note how this stanza ties into the Lord's Prayer ("your kingdom come, on earth your will be done."), and states how all peoples will be united to serve God and to "learn to live as one."

The tune "Finlandia," by the Finnish composer Jean Sibelius (1865-1957), was originally a part of a larger work written in 1899 as a protest against Russian oppression. Sibelius revised the work in 1900 into a stand-alone symphonic tone poem, and later a song and choral work. The tune is also commonly sung with the hymns "Be Still My Soul" and "We Rest On Thee." Although "Finlandia" is not the official anthem of Finland, it is perhaps the country's most important and well-known national song.

If you have the opportunity, take a few moments to read the words of the hymn. It is truly an inspiring reflection on the beauty of God's creation, and of the hope that all peoples could come together as one, in peace, to celebrate God and what God has provided.

To help lead us in the singing of this hymn on July 3rd, we will welcome to the 10:30 service as special musical guests the Marionaires, with Emanuel's John Hoch and Dennis Swartz! They have been entertaining Marion and surrounding counties since 1980 with their distinctive barbershop harmonies, and we are delighted that they will be lifting their voices to the glory of God in our wonderful house of worship that morning!
