### Looking Back with Alicia

I was given this writing about a dandelion by Barb Bosh recently and thought it might change the way you think about what most people think a nuisance. You have to remember it is one of God's creations.

"Hello, I'm a dandelion. A lot of people call me a weed but I'm a friend and come to help you!

My flowers are the first food for insects after hibernation and unlike most other plants, I have pollen and nectar, not merely one or the other! And I am generous with them!

When you see me, remember that I'm the only one who wants and can grow in that particular spot. Because: Either the soil is too compact/hard/stomped and I want to loosen it for you with my roots. Or there is too little calcium in the soil-don't worry, I will replenish that for you with the dying of my leaves. Or the soil is too acidic, but will also improve that for you give me the chance. Or a mixture of the above reasons, of course.

I'm here because your soil needs my help so best you let me grow without disturbing me! When everything is fixed, I will disappear again, I promise! Are you trying to remove me prematurely with my root? However meticulous you are, I will return 2 times as strong! Just until your soil is improved. You can even tell by my growth at which stage my help is at. If my leaves are flat on the ground then I'm far from ready, but if they all reach up then I'm already a long way on my way.

Something completely different is that I am one of the first bloomers in spring so I will announce spring/summer for you. During the day when it's hot, I open my flowers but, in the evening, when it cools off, I close them again quickly. In fact, if it's not hot enough during the day I won't open them at all!

My flowers are even delicious for you people, by the way, did you know? I used to be called 'honey (or gold) of the poor' because my flowers are so sweet in e.g., jam, sauce, or salad! The internet is full of recipes — check them out.

But wait until the end of May or later before you start picking and even then, don't pick everything yet! The biodiversity and bees will be very grateful!"

Maybe reading this you have a different view of a dandelion.

#### Welcome to the June Music Notes!



Summer is icumen in! Thus begins the 13<sup>th</sup> century round about the coming of Summer and how nature celebrates its arrival. At Emanuel, this means the choirs are on hiatus until the Fall, and your choir directors, Steve, Teri, and Carolyn, are beginning to make plans for the Fall festivals and the next Church year. Thank you to all who participate in the musical life of Emanuel! In the sharing of your time

and talents each one of you brings so much to Worship with your songs of praise and thanksgiving!

I would like to highlight the upcoming performance by the Cardinal Chorale at 7:00 PM on Sunday, June 11th. This year we are fortunate to be hosting the concert at Emanuel, so I hope everyone will come out to support them. If you have not previously attended one of their performances, you will be in for a treat! They always say that the Marion audiences are the best on their tour, so let's show them once again how much we appreciate them and their musical gifts! We will see you there! One of my favorite Sundays, the Feast of the Holy Trinity, falls on June 4<sup>th</sup> this year. It has been celebrated in the Western Church on the Sunday after Pentecost, the 50<sup>th</sup> day after Easter, from as early as the 10<sup>th</sup> century. Perhaps this day is special to me because as a child, my favorite hymn was "Holy, Holy," It is a perfect blend of words and music, and simple enough for a young worshiper to grasp a rudimentary understanding of the Trinity. A first brush with theology, perhaps!

A more recent hymn to the Trinity is "Come, Join the Dance of Trinity" (ELW #412). Perfectly coupled with the tune "Kingsfold," this hymn brings a modern sensibility to an ancient view of the Trinity, with its roots in the Church Fathers. One of the first words to describe the relationship of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit was *perichoresis*, which is Greek for "rotate" or "to go around." If you change one letter, the meaning changes to mean "dance around." Think of a Circle Dance at a Greek wedding, in which multiple people dance in a circle, faster and faster, becoming a singular blur while still retaining their individual identities. Relate this to the concept of the Trinity – three divine persons of the One God forming a single, complete Unity.

The text of "Come, Join the Dance of Trinity" (written by Richard Leach (b. 1953), a former UCC Pastor, and now a layperson of the ELCA) beautifully articulates the distinct role of each member of the Trinity, while drawing out how each intertwine, or dance, together. Verse 1 is based on Genesis 1, and tells how the Trinity spurred the beginning of creation. Verse 2 is centered on the life of Jesus, from birth to death. The third Verse tells of the Spirit, "as wind and tongues of flame set people free at Pentecost to tell the Savior's name." The final verse is a celebration of the Trinity and a petition to raise our voices and join in the Dance. Indeed, the entire hymn is an invitation to interact with and join in the Dance – "Come, join the dance"; "Come, see the face"; "Come, speak aloud." Join in and share the good news!

Within the dance of Trinity, before all worlds begun, we sing the praises of the Three, the Father, Spirit, Son. Let voices rise and interweave, by love and hope set free, to shape in song this joy, this life: the dance of Trinity.



### Journey Through the Bible Together

Pastor Mike has started a new Bible study on Sunday afternoons. We are taking time to read the entire Bible together, from Genesis to Revelation, from cover to cover. It is interesting that the vast majority of Christians have not actually read the entire once. This is the book that we confess to be the rule, source, guide and norm of all that we think, say, and do. Maybe we should actually read it.

We began with Genesis and will take one to three weeks working through each book, depending on the discussion and conversation. Pastor Mike has notes and handouts to guide us through this journey. This has always been an enjoyable journey for Pastor Mike in all his congregations. We have about 18 people gathering for this study, but there is still more room for you to join us.

We meet on Sundays from 2p – 4p. We will meet most Sundays. You don't have to be at every single week to get benefit from the study. We will let everyone know where we are in the Bible from week to week. So join us when you are able. We have just completed Psalms, so you can still jump in!
