Honoring a Faithful Servant – Thank you Norma Fanello!

When Ann Thomas was asked to coordinate the Comfort Quilters in 2002, Norma Fanello and Gail Helwig were responsible for preparing the quilts to be tied. Laying out the quilts involved laying a sheet first. The second layer is the batting and the third layer is the colorful top. The sheet is larger than the rest of the layers so it can be turned and pinned for the binding. In two hours, Norma and Gail would lay out 12-24 quilts! They also spent time at home preparing the sheets and making tops. When Gail could no longer help, Ann Thomas took over working with Norma. During covid, Norma took all the materials home and continued to prepare the quilts by herself and she has continued working on quilts at home in the four years since! Then in September of this year, Norma decided it was time to retire from laying out the quilts. We want to recognize the work that Norma has done for more than 20 years! Norma has been a faithful servant of God all these years. Matthew 25:23 says, "Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful with a few things...Come and share your master's happiness." We have been blessed by Norma's quiet, behind the scenes service. Norma, thanks be to God for being a role model for us to follow.

Pastor completed his National Disaster Spiritual certification through the National Disaster Interfaiths Network in 2017. Pastor has been a member of the Emerald Society of Columbus for about 20 years. He has served as the chaplain for the last ten years (he has also served as the Secretary, Vice President, and President).

Looking Back with Alicia Mayes

There is very little information in the mid 1980's about the life of Emanuel so I am starting with Pastor James Rave leaving after being our Senior Pastor since 1973.

Many of you, I'm sure, remember Pastor Rave, his wife, Carol, and their children Krista and Mark.

Pastor Rave wrote a letter to the Emanuel congregation in November of 1985 stating that he had received a Letter of Call to be an assistant to the Bishop of the Ohio District of our American Lutheran Church. This call was issued by the Ohio District Council. He took several weeks to make his decision.

Pastor Rave had been Emanuel's Senior Pastor for 13 years when in January of 1986 he took the position with the Ohio District Office in Columbus to serve as assistant to the new bishop, the Rev. Robert W. Kelley. Bishop Kelley assumed his new position on January 2, 1986. Pastor Rave was selected by the new bishop to be one of four assistants engaged in working at the District Office. Pastor Rave would be responsible for the area bordered by Delaware, Mt. Vernon, Sandusky, Fremont and Marysville. He would have a "hands-on" relationship with the Pastors in this area.

There was a reception held on January 12 in the church parlor to honor Pastor Rave and his family.

I found a newsletter from February of 1986 with a letter from Pastor Arnold Wulff that was our Associate Pastor at that time. He was taking over the duties at Emanuel with the transition between Pastor Rave leaving and finding a new Senior Pastor. I will write a portion of what Pastor Wulff had to say:

Dear People of God: I am so very grateful to many of you for the verbal and written comments and notes regarding my pastoral ministry during this interim period in Emanuel's history. Your expressions of confidence, your offers of help and your prayers are most encouraging and give me the strength and assurance I need for the added responsibilities to which I have fallen heir.

If you were here at Emanuel at that time and knew Pastor Wulff you will remember how humble and kind he was.

The same newsletter told that our intern at that time, Bill Beckwith, would also be assisting Pastor Wulff with the church duties. Many of you may remember Bill.

The call committee made their recommendation to call J. Weston Jones. A vote was taken by the congregation and a call was sent to Pastor Jones. He was installed as our Senior Pastor November 2, 1986. He came from Lord of Life Lutheran Church in Worthington, Ohio. Pastor Jones and his wife, Donna Marie and their daughter, Jacquelyn, became members of our church family.

I know a lot of you remember Pastor Jones and his family. He and Donna Marie were here at Emanuel for the kickoff of our 150th Anniversary Year in September of 2023.

After Pastor Rave left Emanuel in 1986 he served two years as Assistant to the Bishop for the Ohio District. On Sunday, December 6, 1987, at First Lutheran Church in Findlay, Pastor Rave was installed as the Bishop of the Northwestern Ohio Synod of the newly formed Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. He and Carol moved from Marion to Findlay where the synod office is located. Bishop Rave and his family transferred their membership from Emanuel to First Lutheran Church in Findlay.



Bishop James Rave brings greetings from 113,000 baptized Lutherans in the ELCA's Northwestern Ohio Synod to Pope John Paul of the Roman Catholic Church. The meeting took place at the Vatican in Rome.

In my searching through papers, I found a picture of Bishop Rave shaking hands with Pope John Paul in 1995. He was among a dozen bishops and church wide staff that spent 4 weeks traveling to 5 countries participating in conversations with leaders of different churches. The group traveled to Rome where Bishop Rave met the pope. He served as bishop for eleven years and announced his retirement in September of 1998.

He and Carol eventually moved to Ormond Beach, Florida. Pastor Rave died February 17, 2021 and a memorial service was held at Emanuel. Carol still resides in Ormond Beach. We received kind notes from Carol during our 150th Anniversary Year.

In May of 1987 an organ committee was organized to get quotes and plan for a new organ. Members of the committee were as follows: John Walker, James Anderson, Edwin Baldauf, Sandra Becker, Jack Bull, Harold Denzer, Jr., Linda Dietrich, Carolyn Fox, James Gast, Allan Geyer, Marcia Geyer, Pastor J. Weston Jones, Allan Lust, Burke Ries, Thomas Schifer, George Stanforth, Richard Straub, Wanda Straub, Vivian Unroe, Pastor Arnold Wulff and James Zarzyczny.

The new organ was dedicated November 18, 1990. It is a Casavant Opus 3688 with 3 manuals, 34 stops, 50 ranks, and 2900 pipes which includes the antiphonal organ, placed on the balcony rail. This is our present organ.

The cost of the new organ (our present organ) was \$356,820. The renovation of the sanctuary, including stripping and refinishing the pews, refinishing woodwork and ceiling, new chancel hardwood floors, interior painting and gold leaf, new aisle carpets, new chancel lighting and a new sound system placed the total project cost at \$500,000. Many of you may remember when this renovation was being done. If you can believe it, that was 34 years ago.

In the April 12, 1988 Church Council minutes it was reported that the Board of Directors of Johnston Supply voted to pay for the fans to be installed in the sanctuary. The installation of the fans began on October 12. Those fans are still used today to circulate the air in the sanctuary.

In the annual report for 1988 the Board of Elders reported that Pastor Arnold Wulff had retired from being our Associate Pastor and was now our part-time Visitation Pastor for the homebound and shut-ins. A call committee was formed and we called Pastor Rob Carlson to be our new Associate Pastor. Pastor Carlson, his wife, Dianna and their daughter, Erin came to Emanuel in late August. He was installed September 11, 1988. He and his family transferred to Emanuel from St. Luke's in North Baltimore, Ohio.

In the minutes of the February 14, 1989 Church Council meeting the Latch Key Program that had been talked about for several months had been approved by the congregation. This program would begin at the start of the 1989-1990 school year. This was a ministry of service to parents whose children needed supervised nurture and care during the after-school hours. This was what Emanuel offered before the Daycare program started.

The 1989 Annual Report stated that a new worship service and style on Thursday evenings, was started. That is when the Praise Service started. The congregation voted on July 28th to end that service after 35 years.

In the 1990 Annual Report it was stated that 1990 had seen many changes that took place. The old Moehler Organ was sold and removed from the church, the Sunday services were changed to the parlor while the sanctuary renovation was being done and then back to the sanctuary and the installation of the new Casavant Organ. The new organ was built by the Casavant Organ Company in Hyacinthe, Quebec, Canada. The company was founded in 1879 and is still in business today.

Steeple Sightings

Wow! As much as I love my little nest up here in the rafters, there are times when I feel the need to get cozy in a safe warm corner and snooze until the weather changes to something more comfortable. Since it seems like each part of the country is sending us samples of their experiences, and wondering how different time zones are affected, I thought I'd swoop down after a Wednesday night rehearsal to question someone who's served in each of the four---Steve deWeber. But I learned it's more north to south rather than east to west that truly is the deciding factor.

So, after I got his attention, ('cause that's what a TALKING bat does) I asked him about himself while trying to assure him he was really talking to an understanding flying mammal.

Steve has indeed lived and worked in all four time zones of continental United States beginning with being born in Walla Walla, Washington then down to Los Angeles so he could grow up in Southern California where he played piano and sang in school and church choirs.

After high school he attended the Nazarene University and eventually graduated from Bartlesville in Oklahoma with a major in music and vocal performance. But he wasn't through travelling (remember, he had a couple more time zones to go) before settling down.

Finally, he left the student world to teach and raise his family with wife Cindy.

He added to his career history with full-time positions in California, Oklahoma, Idaho before coming to Ohio's Marion City and Elgin school districts, working in music, and with teens and outreach programs. 
