It's A New Day

After this the Lord appointed seventy others and sent them on ahead of him in pairs to every town and place where he himself intended to go. He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore, ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest. Go on your way; I am sending you out like lambs into the midst of wolves. Carry no purse, no bag, no sandals, and greet no one on the road. Whatever house you enter, first say, 'Peace to this house!' And if a person of peace is there, your peace will rest on that person, but if not, it will return to you. Remain in the same house, eating and drinking whatever they provide, for the laborer deserves to be paid. Do not move about from house to house. Whenever you enter a town and its people welcome you, eat what is set before you; cure the sick who are there, and say to them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' But whenever you enter a town that clings to our feet, we wipe off in protest against you. Yet know this: the kingdom of God has come near.' I tell you, on that day it will be more tolerable for Sodom than for that town. -Luke 10:1-12

This passage in Luke is the sending out of the seventy. It's an exciting time for the followers of Jesus. Up till now, they have been watching Jesus do everything. Now Jesus sends them out to do everything that he has been doing. They are surprised they were able to accomplish all these things!

Welcome to this month's Music Notes

Wow! You are Awesome, Emanuel! What an amazing celebration of our church's anniversary we had on September 8th! It was an inspiring service, as we looked back on our 150 year history, while looking forward to the possibilities of the next 150 years. It was an honor to be a part of this service, and many months were spent

working on what I hoped would be uplifting and appropriate music. As an organist, there is not much better than a full sanctuary, with so many voices singing praise to the Lord!

Thank You to all of our music directors, and all those who participated in one or more music ensembles. And a special Thank You to the "guest" musicians who joined us in the choir and choir accompaniment ensemble. Your contributions helped make the service a success.

Like many people, I look forward to October and to the onset of Autumn. Although Fall begins a week or so before October comes, it doesn't seem to actually arrive until the days and nights become cooler, foretelling the colder days ahead.

As a church musician, for me the coming of October brings a time to reflect on the earliest American hymns, as October serves as a kind of "Prelude" to the coming harvest and Thanksgiving, perhaps the quintessential American holiday. I remember one Saturday morning in high school being awakened by eerie, haunting sounds emanating from our downstairs stereo. What was this unearthly, intriguing, noise? My father was listening to a recording of shape note hymn singing, which I had not heard before. It is a sound like no other, primeval but beautiful, simple but complex.

Shape note singing originated in Colonial New England, as a way to teach hymns to congregations without formal music training, and became particularly popular in the American South. Each musical pitch was given its own shape that matched up with the *solfege* syllables (Fa, Sol, La, Mi) with which the notes of the musical scale are sung. The singing is unaccompanied, usually in 3 part, later in 4 part, harmony. It is still enthusiastically practiced today.

There are quite a few hymns in the ELW from the shape note songbooks, such as The Sacred Harp, Kentucky Harmony, and Southern Harmony. One that I would like to highlight is Amazing Grace. Although the hymn was originally published in Great Britain in 1779, it was not published with the familiar tune "New Britain" until the 1835 publication of William Walker's Southern Harmony. The first 4 verses are those that are familiar to us. However, there are 2 additional verses that are not included in the ELW. These verses add a fitting ending to the hymn, one of hope and salvation.

Yes, when this flesh and heart shall fail, And mortal life shall cease, I shall possess, within the veil, A life of joy and peace.

The earth shall soon dissolve like snow, The sun forbear to shine; But God, who called me here below, Will be forever mine.

Trinity Lutheran Church in Pleasant Township, he was invited to Emanuel as an assistant to Pastor Wes Jones where he remained after the retirement of Pastor Jones. He remained there until his retirement in 2021.

Fortunately for everyone, he received special permission to play in the Praise Band, since retired pastors are discouraged from attending their former parish. Just as the Praise Band has benefitted from his participation, so also has he reaped rewards himself above the fellowship experience. He teaches guitar and being in the Praise Band demands more diligent practicing. Yep, teachers must practice, too!

Pastor Mark is the father of 2 children, keeps himself busy providing supply pulpit coverage to other groups and camping with Diane and Lola, their miniature German Shepherd. Sports interests include the Pittsburgh Steelers, basketball, baseball, and rooting for the Ohio State and Miami football teams.

Hearing about all those sports while watching his workout session, it's a wonder that I barely made it back home to my steeple without crashing down from the sky out of sheer exhaustion. Sleep is guaranteed to come swiftly.
