While we are excited to be resuming many fun and faith filled activities at Emanuel, we remain ever cautious and aware of the Covid19 pandemic. As you will see in this edition of the Good News Newsletter, we are happy to be resuming many bible studies, our Sunday School program, and home visitations. Thank you for everyone's patience and input as we continue moving forward.

...he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you." John 20: 20,21a

In John's gospel we read that Jesus appeared to the disciples on the evening of that first Easter Day. In doing so, he revealed to them his resurrected body, which included scars. This is where I pick up sharing the words of JR Briggs from his book, <u>A Time to Heal,</u> <u>Offering Hope to a Wounded World in the Name of Jesus</u>.

Briggs points out that Jesus' resurrected body still bore visible, physical scars. So Briggs then continues by writing that as we seek to follow the resurrected, scar-bearing Christ we must face several realities;

- 1. We must healthily embrace our own failures as failures teach us things success cannot. So we then need to ask ourselves, *How will I respond when I fail?*
- 2. We must reveal our wounds to others, being a model for others as we share our courage, authenticity, humble weakness, and as we build connection, trust, and empathy.
- 3. We must grieve the loss of the certainty we once knew.
- 4. We must acknowledge and repent of our idols and he notes that many idols are rooted in Christendom.

We want always to remember that the way Jesus identified himself, the way he offered evidence he was the Messiah, was through his healing.

Healing involves more than thoughts and prayers. Actionless prayer can often create more pain. The church is called to be spiritual and emotional first responders. God works through us by the work of the Holy Spirit revealing the active presence of God's comfort and healing in the world by;

- empowering us--giving life, people serving
- purifying us--offering blessings in this world
- revealing to us--giving evidence of God
- unifying us--mending and reconciling

Briggs continues then stating that if the world is ever going to consider looking in the direction of the church for its healing, we must first look into ten specific areas;

1. We need to see the Bible as a book written to traumatized people, written to discouraged, displaced, distressed and oppressed people who were marked by trauma. We need to read scripture through the lens of trauma and trauma is everywhere there are wounds and brokenness. So we ask

ourselves, Where do we long to experience healing and where can we join God in the work of healing?

- 2. We need to listen to and tell stories. Stories have healing power because stories connect us. Trauma and woundedness disconnect us while healing connects us. When people are heard the healing may begin--artist, musicians, and poets do this. We need to also tell stories of healers.
- 3. Look for trauma. Be aware. Suffering people need empathy and acceptance.
- 4. Explore your own wounds and trauma. If we are to be healers, we need to address our own trauma and woundedness. Richard Rohr wrote, if we do not transform pain, we will most assuredly transmit it--usually to those closest to us.
- 5. Look for tears--in others and in yourself. Tears are a gracious gift from God--tears are a release when we are overwhelmed, scared, scarred or saddened. Tears are sacred moments, theology is built into our biology. Tears are liquid prayers.
- 6. Look for everyday practices and elements where healing can occur. Healing happens when people strongly sense that they are in a safe place to tell their story and to hear others tell their stories.
- 7. Look for healers who are already in your midst. Use the gifts of members of your congregation.
- 8. Look for the passions in your congregation.
- 9. Look for the healers within your broader community. Where is great pain, tragedy or need in the community, where do people immediately think to turn to for help?
- 10. Look for future healers in the younger generation.

Briggs concludes this section then by referring us to Dr. Phil Monroe, director of the American Bible Society's Trauma Healing Institute who offers three questions people can ask others who have experienced trauma: What happened? How did that make you feel? What was the hardest part? And a fourth...I'm curious: What helped you survive today? We just need to listen; we do not have to offer advice. As we listen, we will find that people will begin to open up and connect and experience healing.

Looking back with Alicia Mayes

Looking back through the old bulletins I have found the background of what had to happen in order to start building the educational building 1950-1951.

The first I found mention of wanting to build the educational building was in March of 1949. The finance committee had a plan to look into starting a drive to collect money toward the building. It was mentioned again in October of 1949.

There had been a lot of redecorating and repairs that went on in 1949 on the existing church building. A lot of money had been spent on those projects but church leaders knew eventually their plan of erecting an educational building would come to light.

In January of 1950 the building and finance committees met with architect, Charles Oborn. He was a member of Emanuel. He had drawn up sketches of what the educational building might look like. The sketches went before the finance committee and building committee and then eventually the congregation.

These committees met with the firm Marts and Lundy of New York and Canton. They specialized in assisting churches in fund raising campaigns. The church leaders knew that they couldn't build without the congregations' support.

On Wednesday, November 8, 1950 there was a potluck held at 6:30 p.m. in the parlors with a

congregational meeting held in the sanctuary at 8:00 p.m. The vote at this meeting was to decide if Emanuel should use Marts and Lundy to assist the church with the fundraising campaign for the educational building and to vote on the dream of a new building with a wing off the sanctuary to seat 250, individual classrooms for all of Sunday school, and ample social rooms for meetings of all organizations of the church. The figure at that time was \$150,000.00 to go toward the building. The vote was unanimous to go ahead with the plan.

The campaign for the fundraising started on November 3rd. There was a canvas of every member of Emanuel. By December 15th the total of the money raised was \$190,151.00.

In the bulletin on Sunday, February 11, 1951 the congregation was informed that there was concern that the government may not allow building material to be used for churches. When WWII ended and the country turned its thoughts to peacetime building, traditional materials were in short supply and what supplies existed were still under strict government control.

In February of 1951 in order to move forward with erecting the educational building the building committee with the architect, Charles Oborn had to make formal application to the U.S. government, National Production Authority, for a permit to proceed.

In the May 20, 1951 bulletin the congregation was informed that the educational building would require 25 tons of steel in its construction. That is why the special government permit must be approved before building plans could proceed.

In June of 1951 architect, Charles Oborn and Rev. Martin Hollensen went to Columbus and presented the request for permission to erect the educational building to the officials of the National Production Authority. They were told to start getting bids but would still have to wait for permission to proceed.

On Friday, June 15, 1951 Emanuel heard from the National Production Authority in Washington D.C. granting permission to proceed with the building of

the new structure. The stipulation on the building project was that the construction had to begin by August 14th. Three contractors were preparing bids to submit. One would have to be chosen and work had to begin. June 30th was the deadline for bids for the project.

Mr. Fred Baldauf was the only bid returned for construction. He was a member of Emanuel. The other bids were from electrical and heating companies.

Mr. Oborn and Mr. Baldauf were asked to spend the next 3 weeks looking over the plans in order to keep cost within reasonable bounds set by the congregation.

Ground breaking should happen by August 12th. The 2 lowest bids for electrical and heating were approved by the architect and contractor. When the plans were finished for the project, the final cost would be \$250,000.00. All had been approved by the congregation to proceed.

The National Production Authority permit to purchase the steel for construction demanded (exact wording) that ground be broken by August 14th. If it is not started by the 14th, the church must reapply for the permit.

The ground breaking ceremony was Sunday, August 12, 1951.

Transition Team Update

The following is a synopsis of the presentation made at the Congregational Meeting regarding the Church's current finances. If you have any questions, please feel free to call Rex Parrott at 740-360-3632.

We created an Emergency Fund in May 2017 in response to the need identified by the Board of Properties for repair of the roof. At one time the estimate was \$500,000 or more for repair and/or replacement.

Where did the funds come from?

- As we had money at the end of each year which was in excess of expenses, that excess was moved into the Emergency Fund.
- We had donations to this fund directly.
- As undesignated gifts to the church came in, those dollars were moved into the fund.
- We had several bequests to the church that were undesignated that we placed into this fund.
- Since the Payroll Protection Loan was forgiven, Emanuel was able to move about \$90,000 of regular giving contributions into the Emergency Fund.

The initial repairs to the church roof were \$102,423, and we still owe \$25,100 on this project when it is finally completed.

The quote to repair the Bell Tower is \$183,160. A deposit has been made and we still owe \$122,400. Work has yet to begin on this project.

After all the bills are finally paid, we will have about \$38,000 in the Emergency Fund, but we know we still have more expenses coming.

- We know we will have to make repairs to the interior of the church, the temporary painting job was just to look presentable for the Rave memorial service.
- We also know we have repairs to the Boiler system that extends to the lounge and library.

Since these two projects alone will likely deplete this fund, the Board of Finance and the PPC are both recommending a change to the Hollensen/Dennis Fund and this change was approved at the Congregational Meeting.

Currently this fund was to be used for: Missions, Visitation Pastor's salary, ELCA College scholarships, and Local Benevolence. It began with a principal balance of \$77,480 and was not a fund designated by the donor. The uses were established by the congregation and can be changed by the congregation. The approved recommendation was that the use of the interest only (the principle will remain untouched) would be for any uses as approved by the PPC. This would free up about \$115,000 for unknown emergencies.

The Church is doing well this year financially, but a concern is that Regular Expense giving is down about 8% YTD from last year. This will be monitored closely.

2021 has been an interesting year, to say the least. We have had many discussions regarding how to handle Thanks & Giving during the ongoing COVID-19 Pandemic.

In reviewing the process, it was amazing to see just how many people it takes to accomplish this event. Lots of concerns were discussed, such as having 120 people in the parlor for dinner at one time with another 30 people helping in the kitchen and dining area.

So... the decision has been made to cancel the event again for this year.

We will contact our church shut-ins to make sure that they have plans for Thanksgiving and if they need a meal that day. We believe that we can handle a small number of meals that would need to be delivered. This way we can limit the number of people involved to make the meals.

In 2020 we had less than 10 people who needed a meal. Most of Emanuel's shut-ins were blessed to have family or friends who made sure they either had someplace to go or made sure they got a meal delivered to them.

Our church and community members have been generous over the years enabling us to purchase the food and supplies that will be needed for this year, so we will not need food or supplies donated, however, monetary donations to the Thanks & Giving fund are always appreciated.

We don't want to miss anyone, so if you need a Thanksgiving meal or know of a church member that needs a Thanksgiving meal, please call Ed at the church office, 740-383-2184.

Based on the number of our church members that request meals, we may need help with deliveries and will reach out for that help closer to Thanksgiving.




2021 - Tentative Schedule Second Sunday Each Month at 6:00 p.m.
