Faith Story Questions

You are asked to choose which questions that would help you tell your faith story. You do not need to answer all the questions. You can add to any of the questions that helps tell your story.

- 1. Who was the first person to help you create a memory of God?
- 2. Who has been the most influential person in your faith life? Give an example of how they helped you
- 3. What was a turning point in your life when God was involved?
- 4. How has your relationship with God affected your decisions?
- 5. What was a time when you had a crisis of faith? How did you resolve it?
- 6. What scripture passage is a "life verse" for you.
- 7. Tell about a time when you felt that God's will was being made very clear to you.
- 8. If you could broadcast one message to everyone in the world and it was guaranteed they would hear it, what would it be? Why?
- 9. What challenges do you face in your faith? How does scripture/ faith community of believers help you when you have these challenges?
- 10. What is your favorite story in the Old Testament? Why? New Testament? Why?
- 11. If you could have conversation with one person from the Bible who would it be? Why? (not Jesus)

PD Ann's Corner: Meet Me at the Well

Proverbs 27:19 "Like water reflects a face, so a man's heart reflects the man."

When was the last time you sat by a pond, stream or a river and paid attention to your surroundings? Have you noticed the ripples in the water or the reflection of the sun and shade in the water? Have you picked up the reflection of the trees on the water? Did you notice any fish, frogs or bugs coming to the surface? What sounds did you hear? Have you looked at the reflection of your face in the water? Proverbs compares a reflection of a face in the water and the reflection of what is in a person's heart.

The dictionary defines a reflection as the act of something bouncing back from the surface. The reflection of a person can refer to a literal image of the person as if you were seeing the person reflected in a mirror. A reflection can reveal something about a person's character or attitude. It can indicate what the inner thoughts and beliefs are in a person.

Exodus 34 tells us about Moses having to put on a veil over his face. When Moses was in the presence of God, his face glowed because he had spoken to God face to face. When Aaron and the people saw Moses, they were afraid to come near him, so Moses put on the veil. When you spend time reading God's word, praying, and worshiping God, do people see something different in your face? Do you reflect the love of God in your face? Do people look at you and want to know why you are different?

Ephesians 5:1 says, "Be imitators of God therefore as beloved children. Live a life filled with love for others following the example of Christ who loved you and gave himself as a sacrifice to take away your sins. And God was pleased because that sacrifice was like sweet perfume to him." The more you spend time in the presence of God the more there is a difference in your reflection. You become a sweet perfume to God. Thank God for being in your life and reflecting his presence in you.

A Note from Don Davis

I had the honor of being part of the 9/11 Memorial Climb with my firefighter/EMT son at the Red Rocks Amphitheater in Colorado. This memorial climb is considered one of the biggest events with participants from twenty-six states.

As the bell tolled and Amazing Grace was provided by the Colorado Emerald Society, the thousands of participants fell silent in remembering that tragic day. Many conversations were heard as I walked the 110-story climb. Some participants were in full firefighter turnout gear, law enforcement officers attended and some people there to be in support of all safety forces.

News from the Board of Properties

First, we want to thank the Congregation for your vote of confidence on the work we are beginning to undertake. The concrete work was finished September 12th with new aprons and sidewalks along Prospect St. and the sidewalk along the south side of the church. The removal of the curbing along West Pleasant and the slanting of the concrete from the glass doors to the street will make it safer for individuals with mobility issues.


The front steps have been realigned and caulked along with new mortar on the coping stones on the steps. Our front doors have been sanded and stained. The south bell tower steps have been redone. The blacktop should be done in a couple weeks.


The flooring in the kitchen was finished September 15th, and B & B Mechanical started the hot water heat piping on September 16th. We had to change the spouting on the south side of the office as the drain on the southwest corner was run through the retaining wall against the concrete sidewalk that was put in 35 years ago! The water was coming through the sidewalk causing it to disintegrate.

As you can see, the Board of Properties has been very busy the last few weeks and the results are beginning to show.

A word on safety -- We have doors that don't always latch. Please make certain that doors close and latch when entering and leaving the parking lot doors!

Looking Back with Alicia

I'm always looking through boxes of old pictures and papers and found 2 copies of Confirmation Certificates. One for Jacob Bootscheller, born October 27, 1876 and confirmed May 8, 1892 by Rev. A. L. Nicklas and Albert Bauchman, born July 22, 1884 and confirmed May 21, 1899 by Rev. E.F.W. Schillinger. These services would have been at our old church at the corner of State and Columbia Streets. They are in good shape for as old as they are. I will have them displayed in the Archive Cabinet so you can take a look at them.

In my search through more boxes, I ran across a single sheet of paper with predictions for the next quarter century. It was in with papers from 1979. These predictions are from the book, "You Can Help Make It Happen" by author Wilfred Bockelman. The book was originally published in 1971. I found it very interesting. See what you think:

- The church will interest only people whose "psychological age": is about forty-five years and up.
- Total church membership will decrease, but those remaining will be more knowledgeable and committed.
- More people not all necessarily Christians will believe that the Christian's primary concern is with social action.
- There will be no more denominational Christian education programs.
- There will be no more projects for building huge church plants.
- Integration of all minorities will become a fact in the churches.
- The churches will give up their tax-exempt status.
- Foreign missions will be less emphasized, probably replaced by Peace Corps types of action.
- Theology will shift from transcendence (describes God as being separate from and sovereign over His creation,
 possessing holiness and power) and immanence (describes God's intimate presence and active involvement
 within creation and human history through the incarnation of Jesus) to pantheism (which holds that God is
 everything).
- Sermons are cut, and so are the Sunday morning worship services.
- College students and young adults will show increasing interest in religion and specifically in Christianity.
- Fellowship devices will be less help in attracting new members to local churches.
- There will be less interest in separate men's and women's programs, and some people will belong to more than one church.
- Breakdown of authority, both personal and doctrinal, will be more evident.
- The Church A.D. 2000 will not be recognizable to anyone today.

The author of these predictions, Wilfred Bockelman, was from Minneapolis and died at the age of 92 in 2013. His funeral was at the Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd in Minneapolis.

I found a bulletin dated September 9, 1956 stating that there had been a congregational meeting held in March to vote as to proceeding with the installation of an air conditioning system in the church. The piece went on to say that the air conditioning has not only added to the comfort of our services, but also the beauty of our services as well. Since it is no longer necessary that we open the windows, we are not distracted by the noise of outside traffic as we had been in the past.

In the Parish Planning minutes dated Tuesday, June 12, 2006, Craig Ciola from the Board of Properties told that the flooring for the kitchen and hallway was ready to be installed. As I am writing this piece, the flooring in the kitchen is being replaced. So, the last it was replaced was in 2006, almost 20 years ago. There is a lot of wear and tear on that floor from all the meals prepared over the years with the Learning Center every weekday and all the meals prepared for the many functions of the church.

In 2007 Pastor J. Weston Jones, our Senior Pastor at that time left for a sabbatical on July 15th and returned October 17th. Pastor Jones stated that this would be to recharge self, spirit and emotion, study issues of poverty and biblical response of poverty, poverty of children in the United States, and visit an HIV/Aides clinic. He would also spend three weeks in Tanzania.

At a special meeting of Parish Planning June 12, 2007 Pastor Charles Steward was introduced and would be filling in to help Pastor Mark Schuring while Pastor Jones was on sabbatical. The money to pay Pastor Steward was funded from the Lily Foundation Grant for assistance of 20 hours per week during Pastor Jones absence. Many of you remember Pastor Steward. He and his wife, Lucille attended Emanuel for several years after Pastor Jones returned. He had served First Lutheran Church in Upper Sandusky for 40 years when he retired. Pastor Steward died November 28, 2020.

In the May of 2007 Newsletter, there was a story about Pastor Arnold Wulff and his wife Ruth. It told that they had one son, two daughters, three in-laws, nine grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. It went on to say that Pastor Wulff during his pastoral career had baptized their three children, all nine grandchildren and the eight great-grandchildren. Ruth was so proud that 16 of the babies wore her baptismal gown that was handmade by her maternal grandmother. Ruth was baptized on July 20, 1924. It brought to mind the fact that Pastor Wulff was born on July 20, 1923. My birthday is also July 20th. Pastor Wulff and I talked about our birthdays many times.

Pastor Wulff also had the privilege and responsibility of uniting in marriage their three children and four grandchildren at that time. The piece I read was written at that time because Pastor and Ruth were getting ready to celebrate their 60th wedding anniversary on June 14, 2007.

Pastor Wulff served at Emanuel as our Associate Pastor from 1982-1998. He died March 2, 2016 and Ruth died 4 months later on July 4th.

In the June 2007 Newsletter there was a piece written about the Prayer Shawl Ministry that had just started at Emanuel. Our Parish Nurse, Carol Columber, at that time was the one that gave many of the shawls to members of the congregation for prayer during an illness, death of a loved one or for any reason it would give meaning to their prayer life. She had a few ladies that donated their time and talent to make these shawls. The yarn was donated also.

We still have prayer shawls for anyone that would like to have one or to give to someone you know that it would have meaning to them. There is a notebook in the gathering space with a note on the front to sign the book and then ask Ashley in the church office for one. You can look at the binder to see if the person you would like to give a prayer shawl hasn't already been given one. Then sign in the binder the person's name.


You may be shocked to learn that each year at least 14 million tons of plastic trash end up in God's oceans.

The Great Pacific Garbage Patch, which is located between Hawaii and California, covers 1.6 million square kilometers, an area twice as big as Texas. This garbage patch contains an estimated 1.8 trillion pieces of plastic, which weigh almost 90,000 tons. This does not even account for the plastic in landfills.
