# Updates from the Special Congregational Meeting August 24, 2025

Following worship, the congregation held a special meeting to discuss a heating/AC project, as well as to establish a call committee for the purpose of calling an associate pastor.

The total estimate for the heating and cooling project was presented at \$210,595 and was approved by the congregation. This will include re-piping the boiler system, adding clean out valves on each floor, insulating pipes, and placing AC handlers in each dormer on the fourth floor. Questions on this project should be directed to Jim Anderson.

Pastor Mike then presented an opportunity for Emanuel to hire an associate pastor. This person would work under Pastor Mike for three years and then could potentially be called as a permanent senior pastor.

In order to begin the interview process, we voted to install the current Transition Team as the new Call Committee. The congregation approved and our Call Committee was installed that morning - Steve Andrews, Glen Campbell, Michelle Rankin, Amy Vanderhoff, Zach Varga, and Deb Yager.

The Call Committee will now begin the work of putting out our call for an associate pastor and interviewing the candidate. If we decide to call the candidate, another congregational meeting will be held.

Cottage Meetings – As the Call Committee prepares to interview for an Associate Pastor, they will be hosting Cottage Meetings to hear what members of the congregation would like to share about Emanuel with the candidate. Meetings will be Sunday, September 21<sup>st</sup> between worship services in the sanctuary and Wednesday, October 1<sup>st</sup> at 6:00p.m. in the Gathering Space.

### Stewardship

Through the testing of this ministry you glorify God by your obedience to the confession of the gospel of Christ and by the generosity of your partnership with them and with all others, while they long for you and pray for you because of the surpassing grace of God that he has given you. Thanks be to God for his indescribable gift!

### 2 Corinthians 9:6-15

I was recently at a meeting with the Synod's web designer trying to put together a page for a new ministry. He wanted to put the draft page up so we could work on, but didn't want it "live" for everyone. I told him to label it "STEWARDSHIP" and no one would click on it! We in the church don't talk about stewardship. But September is Stewardship month here at Emanuel and we are going to talk about it!

The myth of stewardship is that 20% contribute 80%. When we talk about stewardship, it's not just money, but it is also time, talents, energy, creativity, and participation. Studies show that 30-40% of a community don't participate at all. About 5% of the community contribute about 5% of their time and resources. Approximately 40% contribute in the 5-10% area. But it also shows that about 5% give 25-30% of their available stuff. And about 10% of the community give 45-60% of what they have.

And it is not all about money. There are 168 hours in a week. What percentage of your time do we give to the work of the Kingdom? How much of our God-given talents to we use for ourselves and how much do we offer back to God? How much of our creativity and energy do we really give to God first?

When scripture talks about stewardship, God asks us how we got it, what we are doing with it, and what is it doing to us? Our stewardship reveals what our idols truly are and also where we actually put our trust. We have also come to realize that for every person a community loses, either through death, or leaving the community, or even just choosing not to participate anymore; it takes about a person and half to replace their participation.

During this month, take a look at your stewardship of time, talents, energy, participation, creativity, contribution, and yes treasures. Re-align your stewardship with where you would like your relationship with the Triune God, and Kingdom that you want, and then move in that direction.




### PD Ann's Corner: Meet Me at The Well

Jeremiah 17:7-8 "But blessed is the one who trusts in the Lord, whose confidence is in him. They will be like a tree planted by the water that sends out its root by the stream. It does not fear when heat comes; its leaves are always green. It has no worries in a year of drought and never fails to bear fruit."

The roots of a tree provide structural support for the tree, holding the branches and leaves upright to reach the sunlight. The roots act as a pathway for water and nutrients to travel to the leaves. Roots help sugars produced during photosynthesis be distributed throughout the tree. The process of photosynthesis helps organisms convert light energy into chemical energy, which releases oxygen to help people, plants and animals live. The stems in a tree can store water and food reserves which are essential during periods of drought and dormancy. In large trees, a root system can grow as wide as 30 feet. As a tree faces harsh elements, it helps to have roots that anchor the tree.

Go outside and look at a tree in your yard. You cannot see most of the roots, but they are there. Remember that when you are grounded in God's word, develop a relationship with Jesus and are watered by the Holy Spirit you are able to stand any storms that enter your life. You resilience in time of challenges comes from a strong faith in what God can do in your life. You can trust Him to prevent you from falling. When you are rooted in God you have a life of purpose. You can be productive and provide support for others. God can use you to pour out his blessings in others. The seeds you produce can be used to bring other people into the kingdom of God. The shade from you can help others rest and look to God for help. David wrote in Psalm 92:12-18a "The righteous will flourish like a palm tree; they will grow like a cedar of Lebanon; planted in the house of the Lord; they will flourish in the courts of our God. They will still bear fruit in old age; they will stay fresh and green' proclaiming the Lord is upright." As you look at your tree, rejoice that the Lord is able to use you to flourish in this time and this place.

**Crochet/Knitting\*** - Thursdays, September 18- October 23 from 6:00-7:30pm in the Lounge.

Join us for a 6-week beginner-friendly "Knitting & Crochet Discovery Series"! Over the first 3 weeks, you'll learn the basics of crochet, followed by 3 weeks of knitting fundamentals. With hands-on guidance from fiber artist Candice DeWitt of Stitch & Skein, you'll master introductory stitches while creating your own handmade dishcloth. **Supplies needed:** Size 8/5mm knitting needles, size H/5mm crochet hook, two balls of #4 weight cotton yarn in your color choice (a light color recommended, as black/dark yarns can be hard to see when learning), a set of removeable stitch markers, and optional scissors/clippers. Yarns to potentially look for:

- I Love This Cotton (available at Hobby Lobby)
- Sugar 'n Cream (usually available at Meijer, Walmart, etc)
- 24/7 Cotton from Lion Brand (Michael's)

Whether you're brand new or want to refresh your skills, this series is the perfect way to discover (or rediscover) the joy of yarn crafts!

# Looking Back with Alicia Mayes

As I read through the 100 Year Anniversary Booklet of Emanuel, I noticed that The Women's Appreciation Dinners that were held for several years hosted by the men of Emanuel started May 3, 2003. Each dinner had a theme such as Italian Night, Country Western Night and the Roaring 20's. The last dinner was held on May 4, 2013 which had a Hippies 60's theme. Each year the men cooked, entertained, and cleaned up after for the ladies. Everyone who wanted could dress for the theme. I know, many of you participated and enjoyed those dinners. I know I did. We appreciated the men's efforts and the ladies had a lot of fun.





In August of 2003 Ron Layne was hired as the doorman for Emanuel. He was so friendly and kind to everyone that came through the door. Ron developed cancer and died January 13, 2005. Ron was Abby Chase, our Early Learning Center Director's, great uncle. Maybe some of you remember Ron.

As I was looking through a box of old bulletins recently, I found a headline that read: ATTENTION – Women Bowlers!!! Do any of you remember that? Maybe you know someone that bowled on the league. It was a bulletin from August of 1962. It stated that they would like to see all of the woman that bowled last year and any others interested be at a meeting to get ready for another year. The president of the league at that time was Janet Stull and the secretary was Cris Willey. Janet was a good friend of mine when I got older. Janet died in 2010 at the age of 89. I don't remember Cris Willey but maybe some of you remember her. It's hard to believe that was 63 years ago.

We can't leave out the men, there was also a men's bowling league in the 1960's. Paul Weigler was the president of that league in 1962. Paul died in 2011 at the age of 87. I remember Paul and I'm sure, some of you remember Paul and his wife, Irene.

In the minutes of Parish Planning dated Tuesday, January 13, 2004 Jean Smith from the Board of Spiritual Life presented a request for an All-County Lutheran Worship Service and Pot Luck at the Marion Coliseum on Sunday, June 13<sup>th</sup>. A pastor from the Synod would give the sermon. As of that Parish Planning Council meeting 5 local Lutheran parishes had agreed to participate. Each parish would provide two members to serve on the Pot Luck Committee. The offerings collected at that service that was over and above the regular giving at each home church, would go to the Northwest Ohio Synod Scholarship Mission. There was a motion and second for Emanuel to participate in that service and there would be a remote WMRN radio broadcast. I wonder if any of you remember that service and maybe was at the Coliseum to take part that Sunday.



Pastor Mark Schuring

On Wednesday, January 26, 2005 there was a special meeting of the Parish Planning Council to discuss hiring Pastor Mark as our new Associate Pastor. Parish Planning Council voted unanimously to take their recommendation to the congregation at a Special Congregational Meeting Sunday, February 20, 2005. As we all know the congregation approved the hiring of Pastor Mark and he started this new position April 25, 2005.

At the Tuesday, September 13, 2005 Parish Planning Council meeting it was decided to proceed with a new pictorial directory. Pictures would be taken starting October 31 through November 5<sup>th</sup>. The directory was finished in 2006. Some of you will remember that the 2006 directory was in a white binder.



I read in the 100<sup>th</sup> 1918-2018 Anniversary Booklet - On October 11, 2005 Pastor Schuring went before Parish Planning Council and asked that Emanuel charter the Pleasant Cub Scouts Pack 26. Emanuel would provide a place once a month for the scout meetings. The motion was approved and as of 2018 they were still meeting at Emanuel.

In 2006 the green hymnal, Lutheran Book of Worship (1978), was replaced by the cranberry, Evangelical Lutheran Worship Hymnal, we use today.

As I was looking through some old boxes I ran across a booklet that is dated 1912. It is titled, "Interesting Information about the Lutheran Church", written by Rev. J.R.E. Hunt. He is also the author of the Lutheran Sunday School Hand Book, Lutheran Home Missions at that time. One of the questions in the book is, Should one go to the Lord's Supper if he unites with the church? The answer given: Partaking of the Lord's Supper is the highest privilege the Christian has. We might say, "If one is hungry, must he eat?" The hungry man not only eats, but he finds the highest pleasure in satisfying his hunger. So the Christian not only should go to the Lord's Supper, but he should find the highest delight in going to the Lord's Table, where he receives the greatest spiritual blessings. On the back of this small booklet there are prices. Each book was 5 cents, 50 cents per dozen, 50 copies \$2.00 and 100 copies \$3.00. How prices have changed. In that same box I found a larger booklet dated 1917. It is, "The City of God" Cantata. It's not a Christmas Cantata it is for any Festival Occasion. It has Rev. J.W. Schillinger's signature on the front so I figure it was his copy. Rev. Schillinger signed his name mostly in pencil. I have seen his signature many times.

If you remember, Rev. Schillinger was Emanuel's pastor in 1918 when the congregation walked from the old church at the corner of S. State and Columbia Sts. to our present church building.

One of the hymns in this booklet is, "Be not dismayed, O Little Flock," and was written by Johann Michael Altenberg. He was a Lutheran pastor and wrote the piece in 1631. The second hymn was, "Lord, Keep Us Steadfast in Thy Work," written by Martin Luther in 1541 for the boys in the choir at Wittenberg. The third hymn, "A Mighty Fortress is our God," is the most characteristic hymn of Martin Luther and the Reformation. It goes on to say in the introduction that it was probably written in 1529. It states that this hymn has been called Luther's protest on behalf of the German people against the obstruction of the Gospel. Luther sang it at Coburg daily in 1530 during the Augsburg Diet. It has been translated into nearly every known language. The history about Luther rings true from our celebration of the 500<sup>th</sup> Year of the Reformation in 2017 that we celebrated at Emanuel.

H. Alexander Matthews was the music composer of this cantata. I looked the composer up and found that he was a British-American composer, organist, choirmaster, and arranger known for his sacred music, organ works, and pieces for piano and chorus. He was born in England but later became a naturalized American citizen. In America he lived in Pennsylvania. He was born in 1879 and died in 1973. On the front of the book is the price, 75 cents.

I will put each of these booklets in the Archive Cabinet for you to see the good shape they are in for their age.
